Thereafter apply a portion of the following preparation: To about two pounds of unslacked lime add two quarts of cold water, and, after they have intimately combined, let it stand until settled; then pour off the clear liquid into a dish or pot, (the lime is not to be used) Add to the fluid a pint of linseed oil and two ounces of sugar of lead, previously dissolved in a gill of water. 
