Miscellaneous. AN ORDINANCE To Raise Supplies for the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-two.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Newberry, Council assembled, and by the authority of the same:

Section 1. That a tax of twenty cents on every one hundred dollars in value of all real and personal property of every description owned and used in the Town of Newberry, except the property of churches and institutions of learning, shall be levied and paid into the treasury of the Town of Newberry for the current expenses of said Town of Newberry.

Section 2. That each auctioneer within the limits of the Town of Newberry, shall be required to take out a license before exercising his business as auctioneer, and shall pay into the Treasury of the Town of Newberry said license the sum of twenty-five dollars.

Section 3. That the proprietor of each billiard or pool table within the limits of the Town of Newberry, shall be required to pay into the Treasury of the Town of Newberry said license the sum of twenty-five dollars.

Section 4. That the proprietor of each bagatelle table within the limits of the Town of Newberry, shall be required to pay into the Treasury of the Town of Newberry said license the sum of fifteen dollars as a license therefor.

Section 5. That the proprietor or proprietors of taverns, or saloons, where spirituous liquors shall be sold in quantities less than one quart, within the limits of the Town of Newberry, shall pay into the Treasury of the said Town of Newberry, at the rate of one hundred and fifty dollars per annum.

Section 6. That the proprietor or proprietors of each tavern or saloon, or other place where spirituous liquors are sold in quantities more than one quart, shall pay into the Treasury of the Town of Newberry, as a license therefor up to the thirty-first day of December, 1882, at the rate of two hundred dollars per annum.

Section 7. That the proprietor or proprietors of each tavern or saloon, or other place where spirituous liquors are sold in quantities more than one quart, shall pay into the Treasury of the Town of Newberry, as a license therefor up to the thirty-first day of December, 1882, at the rate of two hundred dollars per annum.

Section 8. That the taxes and licenses herein provided for, shall be paid into the Clerk and Treasurer of said Town of Newberry, in lawful money of the United States.

Section 9. That all taxes herein levied shall be paid within the thirty days beginning on the twentieth day of June, 1882, and ending on the twentieth day of July, 1882.

Section 10. That all licenses herein required to be paid shall be due on or before the first day of the month in which they are levied, except in those cases where a license was issued by the preceding Town Council, and in such cases the same shall be due and payable at the expiration of the date fixed by the preceding Town Council.
