Christian & Smith's seventeen acre field of oats between the College and the Cemetery, The day was a beautiful one, and the public having been informed through the papers, a large crowd from town and the surrounding country was out to see the performance. The oats were very fine, averaging about sixty bushels to the acre, and the machines did their work splendidly. A portion of the oats had been blown down, but the reapers cut this portion

as clean as any.

It is a very interesting sight to see the reapers at work in a large field of fine grain. It cuts it, binds it with twine and pitches the bundles out to one side with as much apparent carefulness and with as much accuracy as if it were an intelligent being.

Machine reaping is a novel feature in this section, but has been taken hold of by the farmers very generally. It is a good sign. It means the making of bread and provender at home. AN ORDINANCE To Raise Supplies for the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-two.

Be it ordained, by the Mayor and Alder-men of the Town of Newberry, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the

Section 1. That a tax of twenty cents on every one hundred dollars in value of all real and personal property of every description owned and used in the Town of Newberry, except the property of churches and institutions of learning, shall be levied and paid into the treasury of the Town of Newberry for the current expenses of said Town of Newberry. SECTION 2. That a tax of one dollar upon
