It seems that the new anti-duel ing law does not deter men from a resort to the "Code." We presume that very few persons ever thought it would. The common law for two hundred years did not; the Constitution and Statute law of 1868 did not; and the new law of 1880 will not. Two attempted duels in the State within one week shows how little the law is feared.

There may be instances where a man is restrained by law from fighting a duel; but, if so, they are very few. If he is not restrained by a regard for the Divine law, or by native cowardice, Statute law will not restrain him. There will be men who will hide themselves behind the Statute law-men whose lives are of such a character as not to permit of the higher ground of a Christian standpoint; but he who can make up his mind to take the moral and physical risks involved will not be deterred by the legal. If a man is not truly and conscientionsly opposed to dueling; if he believes it a right way to settle a difficulty; and is not afraid to take the chances before the muzzle of a pistol at ten paces, he will not be afraid to take the chances before a Judge on the bench and twelve men lish about him as a candidate. in the jury box.

But what we started out to say was, that the dueling law should either be enforced or repealed. Because, if a law so solemnly and deliberately enacted as this was is permitted to be broken with impunity it will tend very largely towards creating in the popular mind a contempt for and disregard of all

Ex Judge Mackey has published an open letter to Senator Hampton in the National Republican. Our readers will remember that when Mackey delivered his Georgetown speech last November we predicted that he was laying a po litical basis to stand on in the event he was not re-elected to the Judgeship. The striking of the Confederate Monument in Columbia by lightning the 22nd, reminds us of a simi lar incident that occurred a few years ago in Laurens County.

Several years before the war Col. James H. Irby and Col. Jno. D. Williams, of Laurens, had erected a handsome marble monument near Milton, to commemorate the brave men who were butchered on that spot by tories during the Revolutionary War. The monument was known as the Hayes Monument, so called from a small mountain of that name close by. In 1870 this monument was struck by lightning and completely demolished. No attempt was ever made to restore

The Confederate Monument Destroyed by Lightning.

ecial Dispatch to the News and Courier. COLUMBIA, June 22 .- About five 'clock this afternoon during a heavy thunder storm the people of Columbia were startled by a terrific crash which followed a most vivid flash of light-State House grounds, and that the work of art, the marble statue of a Confederate soldier, which surmount ed it, had toppled from its base and

been shattered into fragments.

As soon as the sad calamity was known, and throughout the afternoon, hundreds of people of every age and rank visited the State House grounds SEMI-ANNUAL DIVIDEND OF FOUR to view the wreck. The statue is al most completely demolished. Mr. W. H. Anderson, an old soldier of Jenkins' Brigade, who chanced to be looking towards the monument when the thunderbolt fell, says that the whole monument was surrounded by a perfeet sheet of flame, and when the crash came the head of the statue instantly fell forward to the ground. When it had reached about half way to the ground the body swaved for a moment and then gracefully fell over to the right side of the monument. The head was cut completely off at the neck as if with a sword, and falling struck on the upper base stone of the northern front of the monument. AN ORDINANCE

To Establish a Board of Health in and for the Town of Newberry, and for Other Purposes Therein Mentioned.

BE IT O::DAINED, By the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Newberry, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the

Sycrion 1 That a Board of Health is hereby established in and for the Town of Newberry, to be composed of nine citizens of said Town, and to be elected by the Town Council of Newberry, so that two shall reside in Ward One, two shall reside in Ward Two, two shall reside in Ward Three, two shall reside in Ward Four, and the remaining one shall be selected from the Town at arge; and that in case of death or resigna tion of any one or more of said members of said Board of Health, the Town Council shall proceed forthwith to elect one or more citizens in place of such members as shall die or resign.

SECTION 2. That said Board of Health

shall, within one week after the election of its members, organize by electing one of their number President, and the Clerk and Treasurer of the Town of Newberry shall act as Secretary of said Board; but in case of the death, resignation, absence or sickness of the President, the Board shall proceed to elect one of its members to act as President. That all the acts and doings of said Board of Health shall be reduced to writing by the Secretary and signed by the President or acting President of said Board of Health—in a book to be furnished said Board by the said Town Council of New-

SECTION 3. That it shall be a misdemean or in case any citizen of the Town of Newberry shall refuse to serve upon said Board of Health after a written notification of his election shall be served upon him, and upon a conviction thereof before the Town Coun-cil of Newberry, he shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than twenty-five dol-

SECTION 4. That it shall be the duty of aid Board of Health to ins, ect the premises of the citizens of said Town of Newberry, and also the water courses, drains, sewers, alleys, streets, bridges, culverts and ditches within the limits of said Town of Newberry; and that when such said Board of Health shall adjudge any one or all of the same in a condition injurious to health of all or any part of the citizens of the Town of Newberry, the causes of injury shall be removed, avoided or abated as may be by said Board of Health directed; and that when or in case of the failure of any person when required to cleanse his premises or any part thereof, or to abate a nui-sance thereon; or in case of the interference of any person with a Marshal or Marshals, or other employees of said Town of Newherry while engaged in removing any causes of injury to health or nuisances upon premises within the corporate limits of said Town of Newberry, any person so offending shall be liable upon conviction thereof be-fore the said Town Council of Newberry, to all the pains and penalties provided in the Act of the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, entitled An Act to renew and amend the Charter of the Town

of Newberry, approved on the twenty-first day of January, A. D. 1882 Section 5. That it shall be the duty of the Board of Health to take such steps as they may deem best to protect the inhabit-ants of the Town of Newberry from any contagious or infectious diseases; and that whenever in the exercise of this duty said shall present in writing to the Town Council of Newberry, any recommendations they may desire to accomplish these purposes. Section 6. That for the purposes of the transaction of the business of the Board of

Health, a quorum thereof shall consist of meet once at least in every fortuight. SECTION 7. That the members of said Board of Health shall serve for one year. SECTION 8. That the members of the Board of Health shall be elected every year, except the present year, on the second Tuesday in June, and for the present year on 2nd June, 1882.


