
THE NEWBERRY HERRED.



A SUCCESSFUL CHARGE.

The brigade was now marched rapidly to the left, toward Ewell's position. At the distance of nearly a mile we struck open ground. The skirmishers in the field were already exchanging fire with the enemy on the crest of the ridge on the farther side of the field when our regiment entered the open ground. We were at once fronted, and ordered forward, in line of battle, at the double-quick, to charge the crest. We raised a cheer and rushed across the field to the crest, but when we arrived there we found that whatever line had previous ly occupied the ground had abandon. ed it and retired into the wooded ravine beyond. A few of our men were wounded, perhaps one or two killed. by the scattered fire we encountered in our progress, and some wild sporadie shooting was done by the enemy after they left the ridge.
