An individual who buys forty acres from the company at, say, three hundred and sixty dollars, shall pay thirty-six dollars on his entrance, and the interest with one twentieth of the principal each succeedie twentieth of the principal each succeed-

ing year, in advance.

The company should get the Legislature to exempt the land, or the mortgage one, from taxation. Then the tax would be about one per cent., and one and one half per cent. to pay the officers—making two and one half per cent. from ten, leaving seven and a half per cent. gain, at compound interest. If greater gains are desired those who want homes will pay the whole 12½ per cent. and do it easier than they have paid their rents for twenty years. A large number of good, industrious and patient citizens, white and black, have paid reuts enough in the last ten years to have paid for a sufficient home, if years to have paid for a sufficient home, if they could have had an opportunity to apply it so. While a man has a perfect right to own half, or all, the land in the county, and to sow it in salt or malaria, that does not make it to the interest of mankind, or posterity that he should do so, and they have an equal right to use all legal means to prevent it. We believe that history will bear us out in saying that large landed estates have not been most beneficial to mankind, physically, intellectually or morally, either in this country or the old world. The possessor may be delighted with his imperial luxury and splendor, and think it is of all systems THE system, forgetting the poverty and degradation on which it is built. If this then is not imaginary, our corporation will be both profitable

At our last Sessions Court, a negro lad of some nine summers was convicted of burglary, and two other negro boys under twenty years of age were convicted of breaking into a negro cabin, in the night time, during the absence of the owner, with intent to commit a felony; life was not endangered in either case, but the boys were sentenced to a life-time servitude in the Penitentiary, the Judge having no discretion in the matter. WHAT WILL RANDALL DO?

From the New York Herald.

The proposition to make Mr. Randall Speaker of the next House of Representatives by a coalition of Democratic and Republican votes seems to gain favor in some Republican quarters. When the Herald, some months ago, suggested this as the proper and natural course, Mr. Randall's friends thought we were joking; but they will soon see, we suspect, that the course we advised is the only direct one, and possibly the only one, by which they can secure his success.

In the next House the Democrats will have 192 members, the Republicans 120, and of the 18 Independents, all or very nearly all, will vote with the Republicans, either because as Readjusters they are opposed to the Democrats or because as Greenbackers they are Protec-

In the Democratic caucus, if it is full, the successful candidate for the Speakership must get 97 votes. It is not probable at this time that Mr. Randall can secure so many; and as the tariff question is becoming more and more prominent as the foremost issue before Congress and the country, it is not likely that his following will increase hereafter; it will rather grow less.

At the same time it is very probable that his followers will adhere to him tenaciously as against any tariff reform candidate. They have taken him up because of his position on the tariff, and to abandon him would not be merely to give up their favorite at the behest of the caucus; it would be to surrender their policy.
