FOREIGN NEWS.

BALTIMORE, Oct. 4.
Further by the *Crimbia*.—Preparations are making in Vienna to meet Gen. Haynau on his return with loyal devotion. The Austrian minister in London has been instructed to demand punishment of those who assaulted him.

President Napoleon has returned to Paris from his late journey through the principal towns of France.

The only important political incident of the week, in France, is the discovery of another Orleans plot. The documents connected with it do not appear to implicate any one in particular.

The Danes and Holsteiners continue to have a few skirmishes, but the former decline to enter into a general battle.

The Cholera has broken out in China, and the Governor of Macao has been carried off by the disease. [Char. Cour.]

THE SLAVE BILL EXCITEMENT AT PITTSBURG.—Public Meetings and Indignation.—There continues to be great excitement at Pittsburg and vicinity in regard to the fugitive slave bill passed by Congress, and while hundreds of fugitive slaves there are now clearing out, public meetings are being held in Allegheny City, expressing great indignation. At a crowded meeting, mostly of colored people, however, after speeches from the Rev. C. Avery, R. H. Kerr, Messrs. Tassy, Aiken and others, resolutions were passed, of which the following is a sample:

Resolved, That the immediate repeal of the "fugitive bill" is called for by every pulsation of a liberty-loving people, and we deny the right of Congress to pass a law setting at defiance the habeas corpus or the trial by jury.

Resolved, That the Christian Ministers be, and they are hereby loudly requested to call the attention of their congregations, to this anti-Christian law—a law which places the image of our Maker in the power of heartless men—to drag into eternal bondage.

Another public meeting is called for this evening, of citizens of the country, of all parties. The papers speak of the feeling as astonishingly unanimous in opposition to the law. An Allegheny paper says that some 150 fugitive slaves have left there for Canada, and adds:

Men of stout arms, and determined hearts are among them, and they are armed, and resolved to be free at all hazards. An attempt to arrest them would be no child's play. We also learn that a slave mother, with her four children, has gone safely through from Virginia direct.

The free colored people are making very active and successful efforts in raising funds to aid their brethren in getting through to Canada. They tell us nobody refuses aid—no matter what his politics—every body seems willing to give something to help the fugitives.

Coming to Charleston.—The Evening News learns that Dr. Davis has been notified that the Turkish Ambassador is about leaving Washington for the North, thence West, and by New Orleans to Charleston, where he will remain some time, examining the rice and cotton plantations mills, &c., in the vicinity of the city.—*Carolinian*.

An arrival at New York brings advices from Central America to the 5th of September. Great excitement is said to exist in the interior of Nicaragua relative to the Treaty recently negotiated between the United States and Great Britain in regard to the Mosquito Kingdom.
