

Smith. The San Antonio Texan says there has not been a single instance of felony of any kind in that city for the last three months. The desperadoes appear to have left.

The Texan has an article showing the importance of a connection by railroad with New Orleans as the chief commercial city of the South.

It appears, notwithstanding all precautions, the Indians occasionally make a descent in the neighborhood of San Antonio. The Herald of the 7th instant contains an account of a recent descent made by the Indians at Hiermo, eighteen or twenty miles from the city, and carried off nine horses. A party of U. S. troops were started in pursuit. The Herald says: "If these depredations continue we trust Gen. Twiggs will be successful in his application to the General Government for an additional force, adequate to meet this state of things."

As to the Indian news, we state that a private letter from an officer of the U. S. Army now absent from Charleston on a visit to San Antonio, states that Gen. Twiggs is moving quietly, but effectually, so that the Indians will soon be reduced.

The Breunham Enquirer says that planters there are all busy picking out their cotton, which they are forwarding to market early, as we think they should.

The Gilmer Democrat says that crops in most parts of U. S. and Harrison counties were turning out better than usual. The cotton crop would be a large one.

The Brownsville Flag says that crops on the Rio Grande are all fine. The overflows of that river, it is said, remedy all the evils of drought.

The Valley says that a Mexican, by the name of La Santa, was hung by due course of law at Corpus Christi, on the 14th, the first execution that has ever occurred in that district; but not the first hanging, we might add.

The Herald says that no portion of Texas has grown so rapidly for the past few years as the northern counties. This is truly so. The progress of settlements there has been more like that of the North-Western States than what Texas has been accustomed to see. It is a rich country, and capable of supporting a dense population. The vote of the sixteenth district in 1855 was 4,500. It is now upwards of 7,000.

BLOODY TRAGEDY IN TEXAS.—We find the following in the Dallas Herald of the 20th ult.

"It becomes our duty to record one of the most desperate and heart-rending tragedies that has ever been enacted in this region of the country. John Robinson, living some four or five miles from Birdville, Tarrant county, on Friday morning of last week, without previous provocation, as we are informed, almost without an intimation of his fiendish intentions, shot and killed George and James Anderson, brothers of his wife, then attempted the life of his wife, and, failing in that, proceeded deliberately to his neighbor's, old man Sublett, a distance of nearly two miles, and while the old man was begging for mercy, shot him dead.

"Returning to within a short distance of his home Robinson finished this horrid and unnatural tragedy by placing the muzzle of his gun against his own forehead, and pushing the trigger with his ram-rod, put an end to his own life instantly. The whole affair occurred in less than an hour.

"Robinson previously had a difficulty with his wife, and had agreed to a separation. Her brothers were assisting to remove her things when he shot them both with a rifle and a musket. Sometime ago Robinson committed a brutal assault upon old man Sublett, and was punished with several months imprisonment, which was probably the cause of his animosity against that individual."

BLOODY AFFRAY IN GEORGIA.—A man named Hornsby, who resided near Brunswick, Ga., being suspected of stealing his neighbors' stock, was recently warned to leave the district by a certain day, the 15th inst. As he did not comply, a party proceeded to his house on horseback for the purpose of compelling him to quit. As they approached Hornsby's dwelling, the inmates fired, killing a man named Rumph, and wounding another named Radcliffe and his son. The party then fired, killed Hornsby and his wife, and wounding a child very dangerously. In all, there were eight wounded and three killed.

MAJOR'S COURT.—Bill Waters, a free person of color, was tried in Columbia last week, charged with robbing the mail on the Charlotte Railroad and abstracting some \$2,000. The verdict of the court was guilty. Sentence, four months imprisonment and 120 lashes—30 each month. Out of this case another grew—the State vs. Jesse Rabb for complicity with the above in receiving money stolen from the mail. Verdict guilty. Sentence, six months imprisonment and 120 lashes—20 each month.

GRATEFUL BUT MISTAKEN.—The leading English papers express their warm appreciation of the friendly feeling displayed by the American press in reference to the Indian difficulties, and their equal gratification and surprise that such a feeling should pervade the South, especially as India, may be a rival with the South in the production of cotton. They should know that the South has no fear of this rivalry. And further, they ought to know that the cotton States feel a deep interest in the prosperity of England, their best customer for the great staple, and the wonder is that England, being alike dependent upon those cotton States, for the basis of her commercial prosperity, should still extend her sympathy and encouragement to our enemies, who hate us the more, because we insist upon a free trade with all the world in preference to subjecting ourselves to the monopoly and tyranny of the free State manufacturers.—Mobile Register.
