"The telegraph office was the first place seized. Mr. Kates, the principal operator and manager, had just time enough to gather up his instruments and run around one corner as the villains rushed in at the door. The last heard from the office, the Lincoln agents were busily examining the dispatches. They did not make a large haul, as only two days dispatches were left in the office, all the others, dating for weeks and months back, had been previously sent away to Richmond.

"The telegraph office, we are happy to say. was rendered completely useless for work.— Nothing was left but the key, which could not be wrenched from the table.

"Mr. Durnin, the junior operator, got the implements all safe in a buggy, and passed the pickets at two o'clock. They are safe at Manassas Junction.

" The Manassas Gap operators immediately detached the wires to Alexandria, rendering it impossible for the enemy to learn anything

from the interior.
"The Federal troops hurried on to the depot, but the train, with the Virginia troops and passengers, moved away just in time to

It is stated that an officer of the Pawnee notified Col. Terrett (the commandant of our troops at Alexandria) that the Northern oriny was coming three hours before their arrival, and all our troops in the town had orders to leave. Terrett got away safely with all

" It appears that Capt. Ball, of the Fairfax cavalry, had told his command that the federal troops would not be there until 8 o'clock, and a portion of them laid down to sleep. The consequence was that forty of these soldiers were taken prisoners. This event has created a disagreeable impression.

"The flying artillery and cavalry from Washington came by the Chain Bridge-the other troops were landed from steamers .-Their landing was well done. A spectator declares that the work was done in silence and with remarkable speed. He thinks the whole number were landed in five minutes. "Our sentinels and pickets at the Long

Bridge fired on the steamers as they passed. All the riflemen down the side of the river did the same. It is not known whether they succeeded in killing any of the individuals on board.'

In relation to the death of Ellsworth, the Richmond Dispatch has the following particulars:

"Ellsworth ascended to the roof of the Marshall House, and secured the flag. C ing down with the flag wrapped around him, he met Mr. Jackson, when Ellsworth remarked, 'Here, I have got a prize.' Jackson replied, 'Yes, and here is another prize,' at the same time levelling his double barrelled shot gun, and shooting Ellsworth dead on the

"Jackson was speedily murdered by the Zouaves. The shot that killed him pierced

" Mrs. Jackson and her sister, as we are informed, took possession of the flag, drew revolvers, and defied the Zouaves, who endeavored to take it from them. The ladies tore the flag into shreds, determined that it should not pass into the hands of Lincoln's ruffians. Another report says:

"A sailor from one of the ships, in attempting to place an American flag upon the top of the pole at the market house, fell and killed himself. The death of the man who removed the Southern flag; and the death of the man who attempted to raise the United States flag, in a State which had severed its connection with the Federal Government, constitute a curious, and may we not hope an instructing, coincidence.'

The Campaign.

- A special despatch to the New York Trib. at wasnington, will be found be low. In view of events which have recently transpired, the plans foreshadowed will not cause wery great surprise. The telegram is dated May 19, and rends as follows :

AN ATTACK ON RICHMOND. The day of jubilee has come, and the 30, 000 troops remaining in and about this city, are rejoicing that they are so soon to show of what metal they are made. That Richmond is the point of early attack, is no longer a matter of doubt, but by which route the force will go is undeveloped.

VIRGINIA'S PROBABLE RESISTANCE. At Culpepper Courthouse Brigadier General Cooke has 6,000 well armed troops, who are in expectancy of an early assault. Scattered at convenient points between Alexandria, and in it are nearly 8,000 troops, who are not expected to make a stand or show fight until they have retreated to the main body at Culpépper.

HOW THE NORTH WILL PROCEED. The Government has definite information on these points, and it is considered by military authorities that the proper course will be to march direct to Culpepper, and thence, if possible, to Charlottesville, where are now 2,500 troops, and thence to Lynchburg, as may be deemed best. There will also be despatched forces by Aquia Creek, and a large force by way of Norfolk, so that on all sides Richmond will be surrounded

WHERE WILL BE THE FIRST FIGHT. Probably the first battle or encounter will be at Culpopper Courthouse, which is a town of 1,000 inhabitants, about 60 miles from Washington and 100 from Richmond, though the route is somewhat circuitous. We are not permitted to send more than this mere outline, even of surmise, but the censorship would seem to indicate the correctness of the
