A BANK's ENORMOUS PROFITS. -The recent death of John Q. Jones, President of the Chemical Bank in New York, brings to light the extraordinary profits of that institution, long and still regarded as one of the soundest and strongest banks in the Union. The origa-inal shareholders were wealthy, and some thirty years ago it was agreed that the profits of the concern, instead of being paid out in dividends, should be used to extend its business. Thus for five years—from 1844 to 1849—no dividends were paid out. At last the surplus became so large that Mr. Jones, then President of the bank, became embar rassed, and asked the advice of some of his friends who were interested as to what ought to be done. By one of them he was told that the safest place for him to put these large accumulated profits was in the pockets of the shareholders. A dividend was declared accordingly, and since 1849 dividends have been declared regularly. For many years past these dividends have amounted to 100 per cent. per annum. The system has been to pay a dividend of 15 per cent. every two months, which in the year would amount to 90 per cent., but just before Christmas an extra dividend of 10 per cent would be paid out, making up the full amount of 100 per cent. per annum. The present market value of these shares cannot be told for the reason that they are not on the market. The last that were sold brought \$1,600 per share of \$100. Although paying out these enormous dividends of 100 per cent. every year the bank has a surplus of \$3,000,000.

NEW YORK, January 18 .- The Evening Post says: "People who have been waiting for evidence to show that Governor Hamptor, or South Carolina, was not sincere in the pledges made; that exact justice would be done so far as the classes of citizens were concerned, or that he would not be able to carry into effect his own wishes, are in a fair way of becoming discouraged. South Carolina outrages on colored men have ceased; the taxes are willingly paid; the State expenses are largely, reduced; members of the old rings are afforded fair trials, and when convicted ovidence spainst them is so clear as to leave no room for an honest excuse in their behalf, and when Republicans take interest enough to bring out a majority vote, as has recently been the case, they elect their candidates with-out any unlawful opposition."

THURLOW WEED'S PICTURE OF HAYES. Here is Mr. Hayes, who was placed in the Presidential chair against the popular vote, and by the most advoir and skilful management ever known in politics. No sooner does he get his seat than he begins to reverse the entire current of the movement and thought which placed him there. Instead of recogniz ing in himself the creature of an unprecedented and desperate combination of men, he thinks himself providentially called to his high office as the saviour of his country. He kicks down the ladder upon which he climbed shuts his eyes to the confugencies of his position and undertakes to manage the go-vernment on the most approved Sunday school pattern. "There is where the mistake "There is where the mistake Mr. Hayes should have been elected to the superintendency of a Sunday school instead of to the Presidency of a great republic."

GOOD USE FOR THE CONVICTS .- The Anderson Intelligencer, in a clever article which we publish in another column, has an excellent suggestion in regard to the use to be made of the convicts who yearly devour the substance of the State. The Intelligencer thinks that they might be profitably employed in resusoi tating the Blue Ridge Railroad, which, it truthfully says, has cose the State too much money to be entirely abandoned. This is one subject, at least, on which the up-country and Charleston can work in happy accord, and it is to be hoped that it will receive the serious and favorable consideration of the Legislature .-- News and Courier.

The steamship City of Bristol passed through the jetties below New Orleans a few days ago, drawing over twenty-three feet of water! She was heavily laden with cotton and grain, and bound for Liverpool. She i indeed the crowning triumph of the genius that conceived and perfected the jetties, and will re establish New Orleans as one of the greatest outlets of the South and West. There is now in the harbor of New Orleans more shipping of heavy tonnage than has been there since the foundation of the city.
