AN ORDINANCE.

TO RAISE SUPPLIES FOR THE TOWN OF WALHALLA FOR THE YEAR 1893 AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Assessors and Wardens of the Town of Wallhalla, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same:

SECTION 1. The sum of thirty cents on each one hundred dollars assessed for ordinary town purposes; also the sum of 50 cents on each one hundred dollars assessed for the interest and retiring of railroad bonds.

SECTION 2. Ten dollars a day by any time-keeper or time-keeper's assistant for the purpose of taking photographs, daguerotypes or other likenesses in this town.

SECTION 3. That any dog running at large within the corporate limits of the town, during the last of August and the 1st of October, without a muzzle, is liable to be seized and retained by the Marshal for a period of twenty-four hours.

SECTION 4. That any person who is liable to be arrested and confined in the streets of this town, and any person so doing and refusing to remove the same is liable to be arrested and punished within the discretion of the Mayor.

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SECTION 28. All residents and owners of property within the corporate limits of the town, during the last of August and the 1st of October, without a muzzle, is liable to be seized and retained by the Marshal for a period of twenty-four hours.

SECTION 29. That any person who is liable to be arrested and confined in the streets of this town, and any person so doing and refusing to remove the same is liable to be arrested and punished within the discretion of the Mayor.

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
