The Famous "Sun do Move" Negro Preacher

Rev. John Jasper, the famous "sun do nove" negro preacher, died at his home n Richmond, Va., last week at the ripe old age of eighty-nine years. He was one of the best known negro preach .rs in this country, gaining his reputation through his famous theory that the earth is four-cornored, and that the sun moves around it. Jasper was the youngest of twenty-four children, having been born n Fluvanna county, Va., July 4, 1812. He was a slave, but was of unusual intelligence. On July 4, 1839, he became convinced that he was called to preach the gospel, and proceeded to learn to read in order that he might prepare for the work. After long and diligent study he became a minister and served a number of churches. He is said to have broken all records by baptising 300 per-sons in two hours. At the time of his death he was paster of the Sixth Mount Zion Baptist church of Richmond, with a congregation of more than two thou-sand souls. and with this object in view the Hon. H. R. 




