Havenel, a young Charlestonian, and a graduate of the Medical College of the State of South Carolina, who practiced his profession here for several years, has made bacteriology his specialty, and his ability is generally recognized in scientific circles in Philadelphia, his adopted home. Dr. Havenel will sail for Europe on July 11, to be present in London on July 22 at the British Congress on Tuberculosis. He will read a paper entitled, 'The Comparative Virulence of the Tubercle Bacillus from Human and Bovine Sources,' and will represent the University of Pennsylvania, the Pennsylvania State Live Stock Sanitary Board and the Pennsylvania Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, of which he is a director. King Edward will preside over the Congress. This Congress will be attended by prominent men from all parts of Europe as well as other countries, and will be, perhaps, the most important meeting of its kind ever held. Dr. Havenel has for several years been in charge of the laboratory of bacteriology in the University of Pennsylvania." Dr. Havenel is a younger brother of Mr. Daniel Havenel, of Keowee, Oconee county, S. C., and is well and favorably known to many of our people, who feel honored in the high position he has attained in the scientific world.

The Sunday School as Educational Factor.

The lecture by Prof. J. L. Mann, at the Baptist church last Friday evening, was listened to by a large and attentive audience. Prof. Mann is an easy speaker, clear in his points, and showed by his earnestness and force deep conviction and profound thought. One of his opening statements, "There is no such thing as Christian education," doubtless disturbed some at first, but he led his audience further his point was clear. Education, he said, is a condition attained when one has gained a full knowledge of all its parts—science, art, literature, religion, business. A lawyer may become master of everything necessary to a brilliant career as a learned and eloquent advocate and logical reasoner, but he is thoroughly conversant with all other branches of learning, but lacking in art; therefore he cannot be termed an educated man because art, which is a part necessary to a complete education, has been neglected. He has received legal, scientific, literary and business training, but not education. So with religion—it is but a part, and one cannot have a partial education; it must be complete. There is such a thing as Christian training, but no such thing as Christian education. He dwelt at length upon the last method used in the training of children in the Sunday school and the general lack of knowledge on the part of those who teach. His remarks were well received, and those who heard him were highly pleased. Prof. Mann was to lecture next Friday night, but will be unable to keep the appointment.

Sheaf Grain Wanted.

Mr. A. W. Love, Superintendent State Exhibits South Carolina Exposition, desires to purchase a few hundred dozen sheaf wheat, oats, rye and barley for the State exhibit, and requests all those who have extra grain to write to or confer with him, stating variety, quality, quantity and price delivered in Chester. Grain must be kept from rain after cutting, heads must be well filled and straw bright and good length and thoroughly dry. Long grain will require two binds to hold it straight, and all grain must be carefully handled to prevent the heads threshing out.
