Passed Away Yesterday Atternoon. Dr. Derrell Burnham Darby died at his home in Walhalla on Tuesday, October Sth, 1901, at one o'clock in the afternoon, after an illness of two weeks. He was in his fifty-fourth year, having been born on March 11, 1848. He was one of seve-ral children born unto Mr. and Mrs. Artemus Thomson Darby, of Fort Motto, S. C. During the days of his boy-hood he attended excellent common schools taught by competent teachers, and acquired a good literary education. He took his medical course in the South Carolina Medical College of Charleston, graduating in the class of 1873. On Jan-uary 22, 1874, he was happily married to Miss Ida Harrison, daughter of Gen. and Mrs. J. W. Harrison, of Anderson, S. C. She, with two sons, James H. and John T., survives. They have the sincere sympathy of many friends here and else-where in their sore bereavement. Dr. and Mrs. Darby came to Walhalla in the fall of 1874. They remained a few months and removed to Ruckersville, Ga., where they resided two years, returning to Walhalla in the fall of 1877, and this has ever since been their home. For twenty-four years Dr. Darby device dh his profession in this community. He has long been esteemed one of the most cupable and successful physicians, not only of Oconce county, but of this section of the State. It would be hard to find a home in or near Wal-halla into which he has not been repeat-edly called. As he went in and out on the round of professional duty his kindly disposition and attentive solicitude for his patients soon won for him great affec-tionator regard as "the beloved physician" whose very presence in the sick room inspired confidence, courage and hope.
