

A Bloody Watch Night Party

Augusta, Ga., January 1 .- Three people were killed and two wounded last night at Robbins, S. C., in a fight which occurred during a party given at the residence of Jesso Griffin. The participants in the fight were white people and well known in that part of the county. The dead are George Dunbar, Harry Dunbar, and Fletcher Bennett. The wounded are Mrs. George Dunbar and Arthur Dunbar.

"A watch party" was given at the residence of Jesse Griffin and during the evening William Cobb became involved in a dispute. Cobb later left the house. After his departure the quarrel was taken up by Fletcher Bennett, and Dunbar drew his pistol. Griffin, the host, interferred, taking Dunbar's pistol from him. Fletcher Bennett suddenly seized the weapon and shot George Dunbar, killing him instantly. The latter's son, Harry, came to his defence, but was also killed by Bennett. Arthur Dunbar, another son, also joined in the fight and shot Bennett. The shooting became general and Bennett received a second shot, which killed him, and Arthur Dunbar received a wound which will prove/fatal. Mrs. Dunbar was also shot, but it is believed she will recover.

The Treasury's Plothora.

Washington, December 81 .- At the cabinet meeting to-day Secretary Gage stated that the treasury rcceipts for the calendar year were one hundred millions in excess of the expenditures. Since April the treasury has redeemed fifty-eight millions of bonds. The treasury is in a condition of unexampled strength. When the isthmian canal bill is considered in Congress amendments will 'e offered providing that the choice of the routes be left to the decision of Roosevelt.

The Compromise Rejected.

Lawrence, Mass., January 1 .- At mass meeting of the weavers of the Atlantic cotton mills to-day, the strikers voted ananimously to reject a compromise offer of an advance of 5 cents a cut and it was voted unanimously to continue the strike until the demand of an advance of 10 cents per cut is grantud. The meeting was attended by about 150 operatives. The strikers claim to-day that fully 500 employees have left their work at the mills,
