property. Section 6. That any person or persons violating any of the foregoing provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to arrest and fine or imprisonment, at the discre-tion of the Mayor within the limits of

bis autority. Section 7. That this ordinance shall be deemed general and perpetual, shall go into effect upon its publication and continue of force until repealed or amended.


