Dead from Negro's Bite.

Atlanta, September 8.—J. N. Porter, a well-known planter of Dougherty county, died here at the Baptist Tabernacle infirmary of blood poisoning, which is said to have been caused by the bite of a negro. Several weeks ago, in a fight with a negro farm hand, Mr. Porter was bitten on the thumb, the negro's teeth sinking almost to the bone. No attention was paid to the wound at the time, but soon after Mr. Porter began to suffer from the swelling of his thumb. He went to Albany for treatment and then came here. Recently his arm, which was severely swollen, was amputated in an effort to save his life, but the poison had gotten into his system and he died, after long and severe suffering.

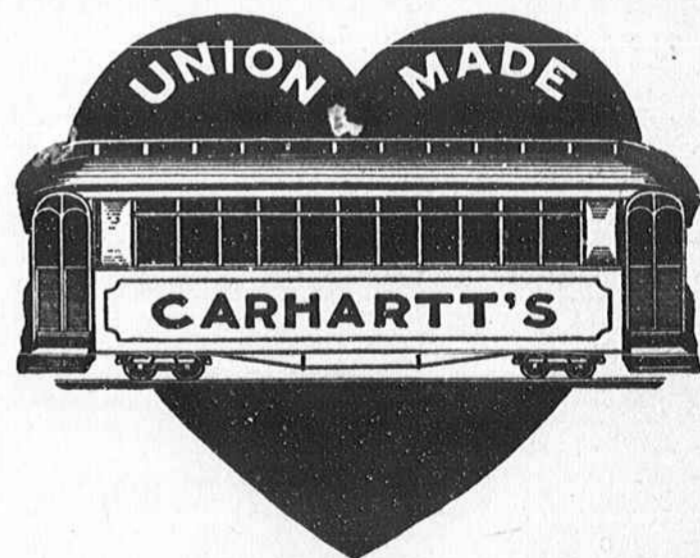
