

### TILLMAN WANTS BOARD TO RESIGN.

**Calls Upon the Governor to Remove the Dispensary Directors.**

Rock Hill, September 7.—Tirzah, the scene of many and glorious fights in the political arena, was again the battleground to-day, and fully 2,500 people were gathered to witness the combat. A giant picnic, the kind that has made Tirzah famous, had been arranged and perfect weather, with the excellent Gold Hill band, made the occasion a success. In response to a numerous signed invitation to talk dispensary and reply to charges made at a recent prohibition meeting in Yorkville, Senator Tillman was present. Senator Brice was on hand to represent the anti-dispensary side of the question. Senator Tillman was in fine form and spoke for two hours. Senator Brice made a vigorous speech. Inquiry among representative men in the audience failed to show that sentiment against the dispensary had been changed, the general opinion being that the country would vote the institution out.

Senator Tillman made much the same speech that he has made elsewhere, the only new feature of importance being a demand that the Governor exercise his power and remove the members of the State dispensary board at once. A "hands up" vote being called for, it was seen that the crowd was with him on that proposition.

Senator Brice was, under the arrangement, the first speaker. He vigorously denounced the whole dispensary system, maintaining that it was undemocratic, that it makes every citizen, whether he will or not, a partner in the liquor business, that it dignifies the sale of liquor and makes it popular, respectable and reputable, that it attempts to make the sale and drinking of liquor a permanent and fixed institution by fastening it on to one of our most cherished institutions, our public school system, that it has increased murder 70 per cent and assault and battery 40 per cent, that it is a common cheat and swindle, a snare, a delusion and fraud, and a vast lake of pitch that defiles and blackens every one who touches it. It is a deadly vampire that hovers with its black and hellish wings over every home in South Carolina. It is a whited sepulchre, beautiful without, but full of dead men's bones and all uncleanness. Mr. Brice stated that the dispensary system could never be cleaned. He said: "I shall never vote as your Senator to purify any such black law as the dispensary, and I will fight it to the last ditch. The only law I will support is one to kill." His speech was well received. He spoke for an hour. At its conclusion Chairman Wilborn adjourned the meeting for dinner.

Senator Tillman spoke for two hours, devoting much of his time to Mr. Brice, the Yorkville Enquirer and others, whom he alleged had impugned his character. His line of argument was that the sale of liquor cannot be stopped, that men will have it in spite of prohibitory laws, that its illegal sale would mean more harm than its sale lawfully, and that as long as it could not be kept out it should be sold in the least harmful way. He declared he was as much of an advocate of the dispensary as ever, and that he would always stand for the system as protected and hedged about when he approved it as Governor and undertook to enforce it. He said as originally designed it decreased drunkenness and gave no opportunity for stealing. The Legislature had later so changed the law and put such men in charge as to give thieves every chance. The Legislature was directly responsible. If the dispensary law had been carried out in good faith by a Governor—and I won't say Legislature, for God have mercy on any laws the Legislature enacts—if supported by that large element believing it wrong to sell liquor at all, coupled with honest administration by the executive officers, by this time the whole State might have gone into prohibition. He said he had only 18 months in which to administer the dispensary law and look out for thieves. "God knows I did not know South Carolina had such a brood of them, but who put them there?"

He spoke of the effect of the Brice law in cutting out 30,000 votes by setting the matter by qualified voters and declared it fair that every man have a chance to vote. He wanted to see a race next year between a prohibitionist, a clean dispensary man and possibly a blind tiger man for Governor. Four blind tiger men had already nominated a candidate, but three out of the four had been in the United States courts. The fight is to be on liquor or no liquor and he deprecated hurrying the vote before next year when the whole people could express their opinions.

Speaking of the election about to come off in York county Senator Tillman said he hoped the dispensary would be voted out. "The people would then get a taste of the evils of prohibition which would drive them sooner or later to ask for old methods of handling the liquor question. Senator Tillman averred that no man had a right to criticize his motives. He would answer to his God for his Christianity. He had been assailed for stating that he could find two allusions in the Bible speaking favorably of liquor to one against it. He drew out three typewritten pages of such verses and asked that the Enquirer print them, after examining their correctness. He criticised Senator Brice for saying he would not vote for dispensary cleaning, and in cleaved to make the point that if he were against measures looking to the betterment of the State he was a poor servant and ought to be asked to resign. He was not supposed to be the master but the servant of the people.

Senator Tillman was particularly explicit in saying that he had come to Tirzah not to tell the people what they should do, but to give them the benefit of his advice and experience. They were free to act according to their consciences and should give the issue their prayerful, earnest consideration. If all acted as he did there would be no liquor at all, but as some were going to drink whether or no, the evil should be minimized and the people should get the benefits from the money spent.

Senator Brice replied briefly, saying again that he was opposed to the whole dispensary business, that the issue was liquor or no liquor and not Tillman or Brice. He hoped the people would bear the real issue in mind.

There was much laughter and applause throughout the speaking, especially at Tillman's repeated assaults upon Brice and the Enquirer and his criticisms of those who called themselves Christians and sat in judgment upon others.

The crowd was orderly and listened attentively to all that was said, many standing throughout. It was evident that Tillman has many friends here and it was the opinion of many that the meeting was due more to friendship to him than to an expression upon the dispensary question. The Senator stated that he had heard that as he was born, politically, at Tirzah he was to be buried here to-day, but there were few evidences that a Tillman funeral was desired. His demand that the Governor take charge of the dispensary situation in the name of the people drew hearty applause. Senator Brice declared himself as also being in favor of this action on the part of the Governor.

### Gross Fraud on Government.

Charlotte, September 10.—The special term of Federal Court, held at Greensboro to investigate charges of fraud on the part of revenue officers and distillers yesterday, returned twenty-eight indictments. The charges include bribery, forgery, perjury, false reports of captured stills and false expense vouchers. Several of the collectors indicted are prominent in Republican political circles. Against Collector Hardin there are forty-nine counts, embracing violation of nearly all the revenue regulations.

### Rand Powder Mill Explosion.

Cannonsville, Pa., September 10.—The scene of complete devastation in the vicinity of the site of the Rand Powder Works, which were destroyed by an explosion yesterday, beggars description. Men were at work to-day ploughing over and digging in the debris in the hope of finding more bodies, but only an arm, shoulder, foot or portion of charred bone could be found now and then, and it is likely that the bodies of the six missing will never be identified, and, adding the little child who was killed by a wagon, the death list numbers 19.

### Woman Attacked Teacher.

St. Matthews, September 7.—A rather sensational occurrence is reported to have happened at the Creston school yesterday. F. G. Craut, a graduate of Newberry College, the principal, whipped a little boy for leaving the school room without permission, on the night of the commencement exercises in which he was to take part last May. The little fellow's mother, Mrs. J. M. Brandenburg, became incensed, and in company with her husband and two male friends, sought and found Mr. Craut on the public highway. She immediately attacked the dignified professor with her buggy whip, but with the first crack it was caught by the latter, and this promptly suspended hostilities, but, so far as known no peace treaty was signed.

### Ex-Dispenser Arrested.

Jonesville, September 7.—F. L. Dority was arrested and placed under bond here last week by the deputy sheriff of Aiken county as a defaulting dispenser at Salley's, where he had been dispenser before he came to Jonesville. He gave a commercial bond and it is his bondsman that had him prosecuted. They, however, had been waiting on Mr. Dority to make his shortage good with the promise that if he would they would not push the bond. Mr. Dority says he or the dispensary was robbed, that caused the shortage.

### Negro Highwaymen in Georgia.

Cascade, Ga., September 7.—Two negroes held up and robbed Thomas Lamb, a farmer living near Cascade, of fourteen hundred dollars, on the Campbellton road, between West End and Fort McPherson, last evening. One thrust a pistol in the farmer's face, while the other went through his pockets. The money, which was in two pockets, they took, and still keeping Lamb covered with a revolver, effected their escape.

### To Maintain 10 Cent Figure.

Most of the planters near Montgomery, Ala., recently signed the following agreement: "We, the land owners and farmers of Montgomery county, will call a meeting, to be held in the city of Montgomery within four days, at which meeting we will obligate each land owner and farmer to take the cotton that is offered for sale by our tenants at ten cents and credit the amount and hold said cotton to prevent it from being sold at less than ten cents in this market."

### Mexico's Cotton Crop.

Mexico City, September 10.—Last year's cotton crop was 75,000 bales. The lowest estimate for the present year is 90,000, and possibly 100,000 bales. The cotton produced in the republic is about one-third of the quantity required for native mills. The annual increase in acreage is smaller. Reports of experiments with the cotton tree are not very satisfactory and it is not likely that cotton from this source will for a long time be had in quantities to affect the market.

### Holding for Eleven Cents.

Laurens, September 12.—The Laurens County Cotton Growers' Association, in convention assembled, unanimously adopted resolutions endorsing the action of the Southern Cotton Association, fixing eleven cents as the minimum price of the present crop of cotton and pledged itself to market only such portion of the crop as was absolutely necessary under the price recommended. Col. J. H. Wharton called attention to the price of cotton seed, bagging and ties and urged the association to look to a remedy for these matters.

### Negro Burnt for Criminal Assault.

Fort Worth, Texas, September 7.—A special to The Record from Waxahachie tells of the burning to-night of Steve Davis, a young negro, who confessed to outraging Mrs. S. P. Norris, aged 20, last Saturday night.

A mob, consisting of 3,500 persons, tied the negro to a piece of gas pipe that had been set in the ground, piled fagots around him and set the mass on fire. The sufferings of the negro were of short duration, owing to the fierceness of the fire, which was fanned by a gale of wind.

The husband of the woman is said to have set the match to the tinder and started the blaze.

Davis was arrested last Tuesday and taken before the woman who at that time was not sure it was he. She had been desperately ill from her ordeal. Today he was again taken before the woman, who on sight of him fainted.

When she revived she identified him and his fate was sealed. The negro finally confessed, detailing the crime. This is the third negro that has been burned in this section of Texas within a short time. One of these was lynched at Sulphur Springs and another at Waco.

### An Atrocious Crime.

Johnston, September 7.—Jim Padgett, a mulatto, was arrested this morning by Chief of Police Derrick as the former was attempting to leave the city on the early train. Padgett is charged with an assault on a young white girl who lives near here. The assault occurred on last Monday and Padgett has been in hiding since. After the arrest he was immediately carried to Edgefield and it is reported will be carried to Columbia tonight. The crime is a very atrocious one. The young girl belongs to a highly respected family. Expressions of lynching are freely indulged in, and Padgett would suffer violence if opportunity offered. It is said he made a similar attempt on another victim a few years ago.

### Some Cotton Statistics.

Washington, September 12.—The census office to-day issued a report of cotton of the new crop ginned to September 1, counting round bales as half bales, showing 469,500 against 374,821 for last year. The report by States shows bales ginned this year: Florida, 2,380; Georgia, 107,670; South Carolina, 37,733; Texas, 258,801.

New Orleans, September 8.—Prices of cotton futures responded during the trading of the first half to the action of the Asheville convention. October showed an advance of 16 points, December 16, January 14. Instances are numerous where farmers hauled their cotton 25 miles, and being offered a shade less than 10 cents took it back home after a two days' drive.

### Hadden Got Bail.

Spartanburg, September 11.—W. L. Hadden, who killed T. M. Glenn, near Wood's Chapel, a few weeks ago, was granted bail to-day by Judge Townsend, the sum being fixed at \$2,000. Stannard Wilson went to Union this morning and argued the motion for bail. Hadden gave the bond and has been released from jail. This tragedy is a peculiar one. The circumstances were that late one night some of the female members of Hadden's family detected a face peeping into the house from a window, and notified Mr. Hadden. He went to the door, fired at a rapidly retreating figure, and returned inside the house. The next morning he discovered the body of Glenn, his nearest neighbor, an aged and substantial citizen, lying stiff and cold in death, about fifty yards from the front door.

Merely a Political Trick, Says Tillman.

To a Ledger representative Wednesday night Senator Tillman said, among other things: "You Cherokee people are sweeping with a clean broom in an effort to debauch the other counties in the State so that they, too, will vote out the dispensary. I will give you three years and if you will enforce prohibition as you have been doing I will admit it can be done. You are going to become careless and let the tigers flourish. You know it took 13 years to discover the corruption in the dispensary system." But the trouble was we could get no opportunity to discover the corruption, Senator. The rascals covered up their tracks so effectively and held the reins so tightly that we couldn't get at the thing. There may be some careless, so we had better keep up the prohibition zeal.
