OCONEE TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

An interesting Article by It's Corresponding Secretary, Marye R. Shelor.

The Oconee Teachers' Association was organized in July at Clemson. Think of the environments surrounding this meeting!

If all this cannot inspire one to study, they are as Shakespeare said of the man who has not music in his soul.

Prof. Furman said, "the most important factor in an education is intimate association with trained and cultured minds."

What made Wofford and Thahan Academy a success? It was the kind, gentle and educated Dr. Carlisle and Rev. John L. Kennedy.

Two young ladies went to teaching. They taught in the same district at different times.

Miss B had spent years preparing herself for her work. Miss C left the old field school and went to teaching.

Miss C was made sad when she returned to her old school, when she heard what the mothers told Miss B. Thus it ran: "You taught my boy to love the birds, trees and animals, to see the agricultural value of the birds and insects, the uses of rivers, rocks, etc."

While a pupil at Agnes Scott Institute one afternoon I was in the music hall and heard Miss S, a pupil, playing one of Scharnenska's master pieces. The next night we went to Atlanta to hear Scharnenska.

Miss McBryde's words have often come to me when I see an uneducated teacher teaching.

There is too much rush for money. Young girls go out to teach without preparation and their characters are not formed and the results are fearful.

If the age of teachers was put to 21 in place of 18 we would have fewer teachers and far better ones.

I want the day to come when teaching is not a stepping stone to something else and that every rural school will have a teacher, both assistant and principal, who could fill the college president's chair.

And that the children will not be educated on blood money; while you

send your child to school the tuition is paid by a dram of a father whose child is unlearned and poor.

This reminds me of a time in Rome when Sernus Tullus was killed by his son-in-law to get the throne. His body was placed in the driveway and the King's daughter came along in her chariot.

Oconee has made rapid progress in her schools in the last few years. The teachers are better and the parents are realizing that to educate the children is the best investment.

We need a clerk to do the office work of the Superintendent of Education. His whole time should be taken in visiting the schools, talking to the trustees and parents about modern ideas, forming trustees meetings, mother clubs for improving the property, teachers' libraries, libraries in the homes and securing teachers to go out to rural districts and aid the people.

We must keep up with the other counties in educational lines. We need a Wade Hampton to lead our schools. Men, think of this when you vote, vote for the best educated man, vote for your child's interest.

Now, it is my duty as corresponding secretary to welcome you to become a member of Oconee Teachers' Association. We want all friends of education to join us. We meet four times a year. If you are a gentleman, you pay fifty cents; if a woman, half the amount.

Dargan Affair Again.

The Darlington grand jury handed in their final presentment September 26th, and after finding the county affairs in good shape, made the following presentment, which is of much interest to the people:

"We present Pegram Dargam for aiding and abetting Robert Keith Dargan in taking his own life, by procuring and giving to his brother, Robert Keith Dargan, carbolic acid and other drugs, with which he took his life on the 11th day of July, 1905, in Darlington, S. C.

Judge Gary thanked the jury for the faithful discharge of their duty and assured them their recommendations would be carried into effect. This means, as will be noticed, that the Dargan matter will be again before the public.
