Death of Mrs. B. B. West.

Mrs. Lillian Antoinette, wife of Broadus Bennett West, died at their home, No. 535 South Pryor street, Atlanta, Ga., Tuesday, 10th instant, 8.30 a. m., after a brief illness from cerebral meningitis. She was in usual health until last Friday, and it was Saturday afternoon when her illness was first considered serious. She lost consciousness Sunday afternoon and lingered in this state until the end. The announcement of her sudden death was a great shock to her many friends in this and other States.

She was born February 1st, 1867, near Double Springs, in this county, at the home of her parents, Samuel G. and Rhoda Herndon. Her early years were spent at their hospitable home. A bright and beautiful girl, she was the joy of the household, and added much to the happiness of the domestic circle. Her cheerful disposition and sociable qualities rendered her quite popular as a young lady wherever she was known.

They returned Tuesday afternoon, arriving at Walhalla with the body at half past six o'clock. They were accompanied by Mr. West and Dr. J. H. Knox. They were met at the depot by a number of friends, and the body was taken to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Herndon.

The burial will be in Westview cemetery tomorrow (Thursday) at 10 o'clock, after funeral services at the Methodist church, conducted by Rev. E. S. Jones. The arrivals of Rev. and Mrs. N. G. Ballenger, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Bates, of Greenville, S. C.; Mr. and Mrs. T. Walter Thompson, of Savannah, Ga.; and Samuel A. G. Herndon, of Tyler, Texas, are awaited. Hence the hour for the services cannot now be announced.

In early youth she joined the Methodist church at Double Springs, where she held her membership until her removal to Atlanta. In her gentle life the Christian graces were exemplified; and, "she being dead yet speaketh"—calling calling to the loved ones behind to look toward the morning light.
