#### "Dried Beet" Horse Meat.

Manila, May 25 .- Officers of the secret service have been engaged in an investigation for the alleged killing of diseased horses for food purposes. They found that the practice existed in several places between Manila and Caloocan, the product having been sold in the form of "dried beef." Instructions have been given from Washington, which will enable the operators of the information division of the constabulary, co-operating with the health authorities, to break up such unsanitary practices. The report on the case, showing the extent of the business, has been submitted to the War Department. The constabulary officials at Manila have taken prompt, and what promises to be effective, action in the matter.


