Cartagena, Spain, August 6.—A terrible marine disaster occurred Saturday evening off Cape Palos. The Italian steamship Sirio, from Genoa for Barcelona, Cadiz, Montevideo and Buenos Ayres, with 800 on board, was wrecked off Hormigas Island. Three hundred immigrants, most of them Italians and Spaniards, were drowned. The captain of the steamer committed suicide. Two bishops were drowned. The remainder of the passengers were rescued in boats. The steamer struck a rocky reef and soon sank, stern first.

A dispatch from Madrid says that the latest reports of the wreck of the Italian steamer places the number of dead at 383.


