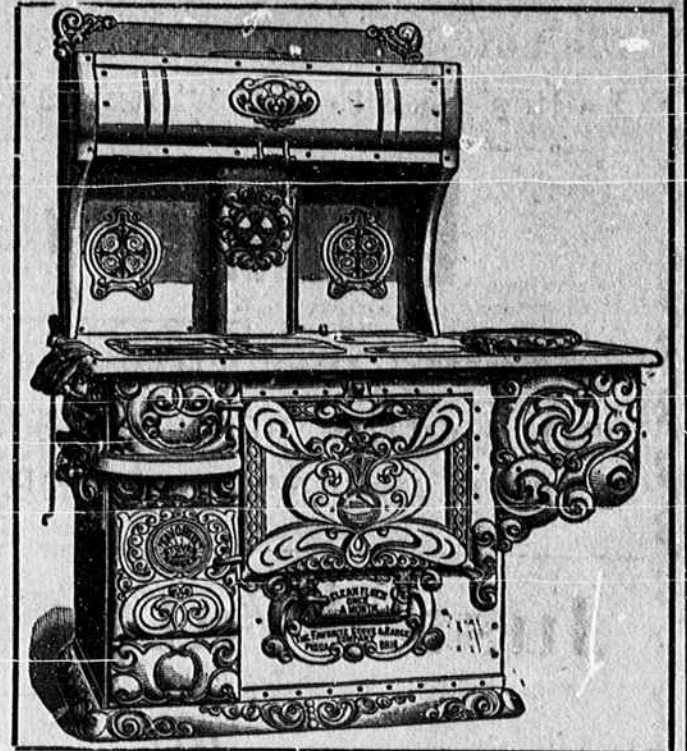

THE BROWN-VERNER CONTEST.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE THINKS IT HAS NO AUTHORITY.

The County Executive Committee met last Thursday to consider the election contest between W. M. Brown and E. E. Verner, candidates for election to the House of Representatives from this county. Charges were preferred by Mr. Brown against Mr. Verner for using money in the campaign for the alleged purpose of influencing votes. Mr. Verner contributed \$5 for the purpose of assisting in the erection of a new church at New Hope. He is also charged with having bought, or offering to buy, melons at Holly Springs, and these two acts were alleged to have been for the purpose of influencing votes.

After considerable discussion at the Executive Committee meeting, it was decided that the committee had no jurisdiction, the matter being a proper question for the courts to pass upon.

Upon the announcement of this decision by the County Executive Committee, Mr. Brown gave notice of appeal to the State Executive Committee, which met in Columbia yesterday.

The contest is regretted by friends of both parties throughout the county, and regardless of their opinions all feel that it is a very unfortunate termination of the recent primaries.

Mayor Jas. Thompson, member of the State Executive Committee from this county, left yesterday morning for Columbia. R. T. Jaynes and J. W. Shelor, representing Mr. Verner, and J. R. Earle, representing Mr. Brown, also left Tuesday to appear before the State Committee. The result will be of great interest to all sections of the county.

Ansel and Lyon Ran Well.

Ansel carried twenty-six of the forty-one counties of the State, and Lyon carried thirty-two of them. Ansel had a popular majority of more than ten thousand in a total of 84,645 and Lyon led his opponent by fifteen thousand votes in a total of 84,015. With these two candidates and Senator Tillman in evident opposition to both and in open demand for the defeat of one of them, the claim that there was nothing significant of the people's condemnation of the dispensary in the result is patently absurd.—Charleston Post.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION.

NOTICE is hereby given that pursuant to an order of the County Board of Education of Anderson county and Oconee county, South Carolina, an election will be held at the Townville school house on SATURDAY, the 29th day of September, on the question of levying an annual tax of 2 mills for school purposes on the real and personal property within said Townville district lying within Anderson county, and the portion of said Townville school district No. 40 of Anderson county, and the portion of the said school district lying within Oconee county being known and designated as Townville school district No. 1, of Oconee county, in addition to the taxes collected for school purposes now authorized by law; that said election shall be conducted as provided by law for the conduct of general elections; that said election each elector favoring said proposed levy shall cast a ballot containing the word "Yes" printed or written thereon, and each elector opposed to said levy shall cast a ballot containing the word "No" printed or written thereon.
