Seneca, Oct. 16.—Seneca white citizens are deploring the attempt to dynamite the building which is being built for a colored college, which occurred last Friday night, and about which the daily papers have contained full accounts.

There seems to be no clue whatever to the causes or perpetrators of the deed.

At a mass meeting of the citizens last night, called for the purpose of considering the matter, strong resolutions were passed condemning the act, and the Town Council was requested to offer a suitable reward for the arrest and conviction of the guilty party.

State of South Carolina, } County of Oconee.

Notice is hereby given that the General Election for Representative in Congress will be held at the voting precincts fixed by law in the County of Oconee, on TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 6th, 1906, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday, as prescribed by law.

The qualifications for suffrages are as follows: Residence in State for two years, in the County one year, in the polling precinct in which the elector offers to vote, four months, and the payment six months before any election of any poll tax then due and payable.

Registration.—Payment of all taxes, including poll tax, assessed and collectable during the previous year. The production of a certificate or receipt of the officer authorized to collect such taxes shall be conclusive proof of the payment thereof.

Before the hour fixed for opening the polls Managers and Clerks must take and subscribe to the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers can administer the oath to the other Managers and to the Clerk; a Notary Public must administer the oath to Chairman. The Managers elect their Chairman and Clerk.

Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m., and closed at 4 o'clock p. m., except in the City of Charleston, where they shall be opened at 7 a. m., and closed at 6 p. m.

The Managers have the power to fill a vacancy; and if none of the Managers attend the citizens can appoint, from among the qualified voters, the Managers, who, after being sworn, can conduct the election.

At the close of the election, the Managers and Clerk must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each office and sign the name. Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the result of the election.

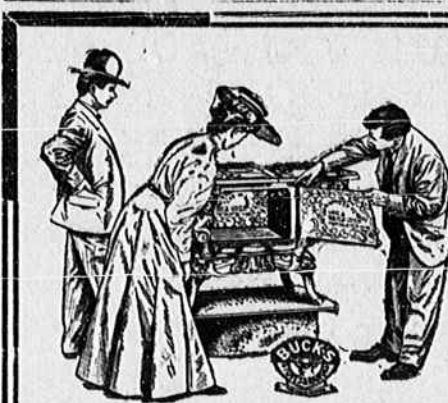
