A TRIP TO EUROPE--LETTER NO. 3.

Amsterdam, June 7, 1906.--We went to the Isle of Maarken yesterday and it certainly was an interesting trip. The people here do nothing but fish, and I never saw such a fleet of fishing smacks in my life, and it certainly was a beautiful sight.

We visited their village and they have the funniest little houses imaginable. Their beds are in the sides of the wall, just like berths on a ship.

Fashions never change on this island, for the people have been wearing the same kind of clothes for the last three hundred years. One old lady showed us a bridal dress that had been handed down from mother to eldest daughter for, I think she said, one hundred and eighty years. It certainly was a fancy thing, all brocaded and worked to a finish.

The boys and girls all dress alike until they are eight years old. The way you tell the boys from the girls is that they have a little round plug put in the top of their caps. The girls wear their hair long until they are eighteen, when they cut off all except one ringlet on each temple.

On our way back from Maarken we stopped at Monnekendam, another fishing place, although they are much more up to date. It was here that I saw the prettiest girl I ever saw. She was positively dainty with her little wooden shoes, jet black hair and very blue eyes, besides a smudge in each cheek. She'd smile every time I asked her to so that I could see them. She was with a crowd of those that came down to see us. I spotted her before we landed, and then I went up and spoke to her. With her broken English and my broken Dutch we made out pretty well. She walked through the town with me and slipped her foot out of her shoe so I could compare the size with others.

When we calmly shook hands and said good bye I told her to meet me at the boat again next year, and that's the last I'll ever see of her.

ANNA GOULD GETS RID OF COURT.

FRENCH COURT GRANTS DIVORCE TO UNHAPPY WIFE OF COUNT BONI.

Paris, Nov. 14.--Countess de Castellane (formerly Miss Anna Gould) was to-day granted a divorce and the custody of her children, who, however, will not be allowed to be taken from France without the consent of Count Boni de Castellane, their father.

The end of the famous case came suddenly. The Court brushed aside the demand of the Count's lawyer for an examination of witnesses and, as anticipated, the public prosecutor did not even ask to be heard.

As soon as the Court assembled Judge Ditto handed down the judgment, which is a sweeping victory for the Countess. The Count was given the right to see the children at stated periods at the home of their grandmother and keep them a month annually during the holidays.

The Count's demand for an "alimentary" allowance of \$50,000 annually was pronounced by the Court to be without foundation in the law and was rejected.

The only point decided in the Count's favor was the imposition of the inhibition on the Countess to take the children out of France without their father's consent.

The Court appointed the president of the Chamber of Notaries to liquidate the affairs of the husband and wife.

The judgment was given, with the costs against the Count.

The decree, the reading of which hardly consumed five minutes, was delivered by the judge in a voice so low as to be practically inaudible to the crowd filling the court room.

Many women climbed on chairs in a vain effort to hear the decision and when they were aware that a divorce was granted they seemed actually to resent the loss of the excitement of the public trial at which the people in high society would be compelled to testify.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 14.--Howard Gould, brother of Countess de Castellane, who is in the city, when informed by the Associated Press that his sister had been granted a divorce from the Count, said that while he was grateful for the information he had no comment to make upon it.

The decree of the Court with respect to the children not leaving France without the consent of the mother, he said, was rather to be expected, as it was in accordance with the French customs.

Upon being furnished with details of the decree, Mr. Gould remarked: "That seems to be very satisfactory."

New Train on Southern.

[The State, November 12th.]

The new passenger train on the Southern Railway between Toccoa, Ga., and Charlotte, N. C., for the benefit of local travel in the upper part of the State in the Spartanburg and Greenville districts, will be placed in service on November 26. This was one of the trains recommended by the South Carolina Traffic Association. The schedule is as follows: Leave Toccoa 8 a. m.; arrive Charlotte 12.35.

Returning, the train will leave Charlotte 3.25 p. m., and arrive Toccoa 9.45. On the northbound schedule going from Toccoa to Charlotte the train will pass Greenville between 8 and 9.30, giving three hours' time in Charlotte between schedules.

A dispatch from General Passenger Agent Taylor gives the information that the train will handle one straight coach, one divided coach and a 60-foot baggage and express car.

Collapse of Building Kills Nine.

Long Beach, Cal., Nov. 9.--Five stories of the central wing of the new \$750,000 Bixby Hotel collapsed to-day, carrying nine workmen to death in the tons of tangled wreckage. About 150 artisans and laborers were scattered through the structure at the moment it fell, and of these 100 were carried down in the ruins, nine being severely hurt. Thirteen men on the contractor's rolls are unaccounted for, but are probably safe. None of the injured will die.

Immediately after the collapse of the structure hundreds of bystanders lent aid in the rescue. Company H, Seventh Regiment, National Guard, was called out and lines thrown around the building, all but rescuers being excluded.

Pitiful scenes were enacted among the throngs who stood outside the lines waiting for news. An aged mother sat all day long on the bluff overlooking the hotel, weeping and watching for the body of her son.

Vesuvius Emits Smoke and Ashes.

Naples, Nov. 10.--At noon to-day Mount Vesuvius and the surrounding villages were shaken up by a kind of earthquake, which was accompanied by detonations and followed by a considerable fall of ashes, especially over Ottajano, which was destroyed during the eruption of last April and is now in course of reconstruction. The phenomenon caused great alarm. Investigation showed that part of the crater of the volcano had fallen in.

During the afternoon there were three more slight shocks in the Vesuvian region and a further discharge of ashes, which was blown in the direction of Pompei and Ottajano. Thus far Naples has not been affected by the eruption, but a dark column of smoke can be seen from the city hovering over the crater. Prof. Matteucci, director of the royal observatory on Mount Vesuvius, in an interview with the Associated Press, said:

"I do not believe this is a new eruption, as all the phenomena preceding such an event are lacking. I think the rain of ashes was caused by the slipping down of the superior lip of the crater and that the earth tremblings were due to water from the recent heavy rains having reached the fire zone inside the volcano, producing an internal explosion."

Dismissed Troops May Make Trouble.

Oklahoma City, Nov. 10.--It is believed at Fort Reno, Okla., that the four companies of the Twenty-sixth infantry, which were started for that post last night on a special train from San Antonio, are to take the places of the negro troops, members of Companies B, C and D, of the Twenty-fifth infantry, recently ordered dismissed by President Roosevelt as a result of the riotous disturbances in Brownsville, Texas, on August 13th.

It was stated by an officer at Fort Reno that the Texas troops had been sent to Oklahoma as a precautionary measure. The negro troops are soon to be formally dismissed and the citizens of El Reno, where the three companies are stationed, fear trouble will follow. The Texas troops came, it is said, as a matter of protection to the citizens. Since their arrival at El Reno, which is two miles distant from Fort Reno, the negro troops have been placed under the strictest discipline, being subjected to a roll call every two hours. The formal order for the discharge of the disgraced troops was issued at Washington yesterday. The date of actual dismissal is not known here.
