### CREIGHTON GUILTY OF IMMORALITY.

CASE WILL REMAIN UNCHANGED UNTIL GENERAL CONFERENCE.

Columbia, Dec. 5.—After deliberating all night over their verdict, the trial committee, clothed by the Methodist conference with full powers to dispose of the charges of gross immorality brought against Rev. C. W. Creighton, came to an agreement at 7 o'clock this morning, finding that the specifications proved sustained the charge, and deposing the accused from the ministry and expelling him from the membership of the church.

Conference had been kept theoretically in session since Monday afternoon, since it had been thought unparliamentary, under Methodist law, to adjourn the session or announce the appointments of ministers to churches until it should be known whether Mr. Creighton would be restored to ministerial good standing. Many of the ministers who have been attending the conference had gone home, but there was still a fair number in the Washington street church when Rev. L. F. Beatty, chairman of the trial committee, read his report. It was received in due form, and Rev. Mr. Daniel, counsel for the accused, was asked if he desired to give notice of an appeal. He replied in the affirmative and the notice was noted.

Rev. C. D. Mann, who has just been elected to the House of Representatives from Oconee county, arose to a question of personal privilege. The chair told him to state his question.

"If that report is right," said Mr. Mann, "then three-fourths of this conference ought to go with Creighton."

A dozen members were on their feet, calling out that the brother was out of order, and the chair so ruled. Mr. Mann took his seat and that was all of the Creighton case. The appointments of preachers for the coming twelve months were then read and the conference was adjourned until the next meeting, a year hence, in Gaffney.

The following facts regarding the case will be of interest:

The charges made against Mr. Creighton are technically embraced in the term "immorality." The specific charge is lying and slander, but Mr. Creighton is not yet convicted, and even if he shall be adjudged guilty of the charges it will not be such a reflection on his moral character as the general public might infer from the use of the term "immorality."

The case is based on certain articles appearing in the Christian Appeal, of which Mr. Creighton is the editor and publisher. The particular editorial on which the accusation rests was published in the issue of November 3, 1904, and is headed "Rings and Results." The editorial said: For many years the existence of a ring in the South Carolina Conference has been boldly asserted and the charge is believed by many to be true." The article then discussed what is meant by a ring and states that such a charge could be proved either by direct testimony or circumstantial evidence. The editorial continues as follows: "We shall consider in their order circumstances that show conclusively concert of action for definite purposes, if not existence of a combination in the conference.

"One set of men organize the conference, select the members of all committees and so distribute themselves in the organization that they are able to keep themselves fully informed of everything that takes place, inspire action, shape movements, control measures, and bring to bear active influence to promote or defeat any and every action as they may approve or disapprove. The organization of the conference represents them, and they are represented in their organization. They continue in office and when one of their number, for any reason, is forced to retire they select his successor. They exercise the power of a self-perpetuating body and that in direct violation of the law of the church to which they belong.

"Second. They shelve the man who, for any reason, do not sympathize with and approve their methods and promote those who stand by them and support each other in doing it."

The rest of the editorial gives other specifications, five in all, but the two quoted above are those upon which the accusation of lying and slander is based. One of Mr. Creighton's contentions is that the methods of securing the presiding elder's salaries is unfair and wrong. In his editorial already quoted he says:

"Third. They agree upon a method of forcing up their salaries in violation of the law of the church."

It has not been the custom to pay the presiding elders fixed salaries. Each presiding elder receives 15 per cent of the total amount raised by the churches in his district for salaries of pastors. Under this plan, when a church raises the salary of its pastor it raises the salary of the presiding elder also.

At the last session of the conference a resolution was passed recommending that the district stewards fix the salaries of presiding elders at stated sums and abandon the percentage plan. But the resolution of conference does not have the force of law and the boards of district stewards are not bound thereby. The influence of presiding elders in the district boards is very strong, and unless they advocate the proposed change it is claimed that the change is not likely to be put into effect. There are twelve districts in this conference and each one of the presiding elders is a man of strong personality and influence.

When the committee was appointed to investigate the charges at the last session of the conference at Spartanburg Mr. Creighton was suspended from the conference pending the determination of the case. He has, however, continued to edit and publish his paper, the Christian Appeal, at Greenwood, and it is said the paper has now about 3,000 subscribers.

He married Miss Caution, whose family have been prominent in the South Carolina conference, and two of whose brothers are now in the conference.

The final outcome of the case in the General Conference, four years hence, will be watched with much interest.

### To Run Government.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The estimates of the appropriations required to run the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1906, were transmitted to Congress to-day. They reach a grand total of \$689,028,543. The estimate for the present fiscal year amounted to \$622,723,151, showing an apparent increase of \$66,000,000. The actual appropriations for the present year, including deficiencies and miscellaneous, which were not estimated for, were, however, \$701,551,506, or about \$11,000,000 more than the secretary of the treasury thinks will be necessary for the next year.

### South Carolina's Part of Federal Funds.

Washington, December 6.—The Secretary of the Treasury in his letter of recommendations of appropriations needed, asks that the following amounts be made available for the year ending June 30, 1908:

For public buildings at Anderson, \$35,000; Chester, \$25,000; Greenville, \$25,000; Greenwood, \$20,000; Sumter, \$15,000.

For improving Winyah bay, \$72,750.

For improving Pee Dee river and maintaining same, \$25,000.

For improvements in Charleston harbor, \$25,000.

### Heyward County Loses at the Polls.

Aiken, December 4.—The proposed Heyward county scheme was defeated to-day by 38 votes of the requisite two-thirds of the total number of votes cast. All the precincts have been reported and show a total vote cast of 504, of which the new county received 298.

A summary of the different precincts follows: North Augusta 160 for, 18 against; Beech Island 84 for, 7 against; Talatha 13 for, 93 against; Sunny Side 10 for, 45 against; Ellenton 14 for, 24 against; Silverton 17 for, 19 against.
