

Death of Eddie Tollison.

New Hope, Dec. 23.—After a lingering illness of typhoid fever, Eddie, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff. D. Tollison, died last Friday afternoon. He had been a sufferer for several months, and was thought to be convalescent and out of danger until last Friday, when he grew worse, and at 1 p. m. passed to his reward. He bore his sufferings gently and said he was ready to go. He was in his 22d year. When 16 years of age he united with the New Hope Baptist church, and was a devoted member until his death. He was a true Christian and a faithful worker in the Master's cause. His many kind words and pleasant words and smiles shall never be forgotten by those who knew him, for to know him was to love him, and he numbered his friends by the score. His Christian life is to be judged by his faithfulness and interest he took in the New Hope Sunday school. He will be sadly missed by every Sunday school scholar, and especially by his class of young boys and girls, of which he was a regular and loving teacher. The beautiful hymns, "Resting in the Saviour's Love" and "Nearer My God to Thee," which were sung, were favorites of the deceased. His remains were laid to rest in New Hope cemetery. His death is not only sad to his loved ones, but the whole community is grieved. He leaves a dear father and mother, three kind and loving sisters, and four affectionate brothers to mourn the loss of an obedient son, and a loving brother.
