Big Fire at Toccoa

Toccoa, Ga., Jan. 4.—Fire yesterday destroyed the Yow business block, entailing a loss of \$50,000, with only \$8,500 insurance. The blaze was discovered in the rear of the store of Bryant & McAvoy, who had only moved in yesterday. Toccoa has no fire department and at one time the whole business section was threatened.

Assessment Notice.

Auditor's Office, Walhalla, S. C. This office will be open to receive returns of personal property for taxation for the next fiscal year, from the first day of January, 1907, to the 20th day of February following, inclusive. Real estate stands as before, but all transfers of real estate made since last return should be noted upon the return blank when listing.

The Township Assessors are required by law to list for all those that fail to make their own returns within the time prescribed. Hence the difficulty of delinquents escaping the 50 per cent penalty, as well as the frequency of errors resulting from this practice. By all means make your own returns and thereby save expense and trouble.

Ex-confederate soldiers over 60 years of age are exempt from poll tax. All other males between the ages of 21 and 60 years, except those incapable of earning a support from being maimed or from any other cause, shall be deemed taxable polls.
