

## Assessment Notice.

Auditor's Office, Walhalla, S. C.
This office will be open to receive' returns of personal property for taxation for the next fiscal year, from the first day of January, 1907, to the 20th day of February following, inclusive.

Real estate stands as before, but all transfers of real estate made since last return should be noted upon the return blank when listing.

The Township Assessors are required by law to list for all those that fail to make their own returns within the time prescribed. Hence the difficulty of delinquents escaping the 50 per cent penalty, as well as the frequency of errors resulting from this practice.
