BETTER PAY YOUR TAXES AT ONCE.

ABOUT 1,800 DELINQUENTS—COMMUTATION TAX MUST BE PAID BY 28TH.

There are about eighteen hundred delinquent tax-payers on the treasurer's books. These delinquents will have up to the 15th of March to pay their taxes, with the 7 per cent penalty attached. After that date the names of all who have not paid their taxes will be turned over to the sheriff, and he will make it hot for them. They will have to pay him the taxes, also all penalties and costs. The indications are that there will be a large number of names turned over to the sheriff.

There are 2,200 persons who have thus far failed to come over with the commutation road tax. There are about 3,500 persons who are liable to this tax, and only a few over 1,300 have paid. The recent session of the General Assembly made no provision for extending the time for payment of this tax. The time for the payment of the road tax, therefore, expires FEBRUARY 28th, and those who are liable to it, who have not paid by that time, must either work two days on the road or hire a hand to work two days. There is no getting out of working the roads if you fail to pay up by February 28th. You CAN'T get a road tax receipt on March 1st! A word to the wise is sufficient.

AS TO TAX RETURNS.

The time for making tax returns is out to-day. Auditor Keese says that there are quite a number who have yet failed to make their returns, and it seems now that there will be many who will have to pay the 50 per cent penalty for non-retains.

Oconee's Tax Levy for 1907.

The tax levy for Oconee county for the year 1907 has been fixed by the General Assembly in the following language:

"Ordinary county purposes, two (2) mills; for roads, bridges and ferries, one (1) mill; for interest on the county bonds, seven-tenths (7-10) of one mill; for sinking fund for the purpose of retiring county bonds, one-half (1/2) of one mill; for bridge at Burnett Tanyard over Little river, one (1) mill; for High Bridge over Connerses, three-tenths (3-10) of one mill; for bridge near Chapman's Ford over Keowee river, one-fourth (1/4) of one mill; for vault and other improvements on the Court House and for reindexing county records and copying, as provided by act of the General Assembly of 1907, one (1) mill. The County Commissioners are hereby authorized and required to use the fund raised by the one-eighth (1/8) of one mill levied during the year 1906 for the purpose of building a bridge across Keowee river, at or near Chapman's Ford, and the one-fourth (1/4) of one mill herein provided for the construction of the said bridge. The County Commissioners are authorized and required to use the funds arising from the levies herein provided for the specific purposes named, and should there be any surplus remaining in any fund after payment of the amounts appropriated for said purposes, they may use such surplus for any one of the purposes above named for which there may be a deficiency, or apply the same to ordinary county expenses; and should there be insufficient funds for any one of the said purposes, then the County Commissioners may make up such deficiency out of the ordinary county fund."

TO IMPROVE COURT HOUSE BUILDING

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AUTHORIZED TO CONSTRUCT VAULTS AND CLOSETS.

At the recent session of the General Assembly a bill was passed providing for certain improvements on the Court House of Oconee county. The law reads:

"Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina: Section 1. That the County Commissioners are hereby authorized and required to convert the office at present occupied by the County Commissioners, on the north side of the Court House at Walhalla, into two fire-proof vaults, suitably arranged, one for the Clerk of Court, one for the Master and Probate Judge, and provide the said vaults with suitable fire-proof shelves and cases for the records of the said offices; and install suitable water closets on the first floor of said building, and at least one suitable closet in one of the jury rooms on the second floor of said building.

"Section 2. There is hereby appropriated for the purposes of this act the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars, if so much be necessary."

TO COPY AND REINDEX RECORDS

AFFECTING TITLE TO REAL ESTATE IN OCOONEE COUNTY RECORDED AT PICKENS.

At the recent session of the General Assembly an act was passed providing for the copying of certain records affecting the title to real estate in Oconee county. It reads:

"Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina: Section 1. That B. A. Bentley is hereby constituted commissioner for the purposes herein mentioned.

"Sec. 2. That the commissioner herein named shall copy all deeds or other instruments of like character affecting the title to real property in Oconee county from the records at Anderson Court House, prior to the formation of Pickens District.

"Sec. 3. That the said commissioner herein named shall copy all records at Pickens Court House prior to the formation of Oconee county of all deeds or other instruments of like character affecting the title to real property in Oconee county.

"Sec. 4. That the said commissioner shall make a complete index, alphabetically and lexicographically arranged to the fourth letter, of all deeds and instruments of like effect in the office of the Clerk of Court of Oconee county, and including the records herein provided to be copied; the said index shall contain the date of the execution of the paper, the date of record, the grantor and grantee, a short description of the property affected, nature of instrument (whether deed in fee or otherwise,) name of dowress; and a cross-index of grantee and grantor, arranged and containing same in substance as above provided.

"Sec. 5. For the work provided herein above and for the necessary record books for the same the said commissioner shall receive the sum of one thousand three hundred dollars, to be paid by the County Board of Commissioners as other claims against the county, upon a certificate of the Clerk of Court of Oconee county that the terms of this act have been fully complied with: Provided, That the said commissioner may collect the amount necessary to pay for the record books herein provided for, at such time as the books may be delivered to him."
