LATIMER TALKS IMMIGRATION

Not Favorably Impressed with the Line From Trieste.

Greenliver, September 18.—Senator Latimer gave out his first interview to-day since his return from Europe. The Senator favors restricting immigration, says he will fight for Federal aid to drain the swamp lands in the lower part of the State, and will continue his advocacy of the national good roads plan. He is a candidate for re-election.

Among other things he said: "From what I saw of the class of people we are drawing our immigrant supply from in Europe, I am satisfied that we should not be making any effort to induce or stimulate any more foreign people to come to America than we are now getting. I am not opposed to people coming here, provided they promise to make good citizens and to help to build up our institutions and benefit our country, rather than prove a stumbling block and a hindrance, as is now the case in some of the larger Northern cities. We do not need a class that will come simply because their passage way is paid, or because they are promised a job on this side of the water.

"I am inclined to restrict immigration, rather than to foster it. I am opposed to the State or corporations furnishing money to pay the transportation of any immigrants into the United States, but believe our best policy is to be content with the natural growth of population. Over population in America will result in the same conditions that now exist in Europe, which are low wages and poverty on the part of the poor people.

"We had better let some of our land lie idle and get thirteen or fourteen cents for cotton than to undertake to work all of our lands and take a lower price for our products, and I think our mills would be better off in the long run to let a few of the spindles stand idle and sell their goods at the high price they are now getting in the United States than to run all their spindles and take a lower price for their product.

"In other words, to sum up, I think we ought to be content with the prosperous conditions that we now enjoy than to attempt to change that condition by adding to our population the undesirable immigrants from Europe who are now proving so unsatisfactory in the cities and States where the bulk of them have been going for the last few years.

"Europe has more people to the square mile than the United States, but Europe is much poorer per capita. Over there, there is a wealthy class and a poverty-stricken class. Certainly we have no desire to bring about such conditions in the United States. Wages are lower in Europe than in America and work is harder to get. I should like to see our waste lands under cultivation, but I would not like to see the world over-supplied with cotton and our farmers, merchants and manufacturers suffer because of unsettled conditions bound to arise under such circumstances."

The Senator was asked what he thought about the steamship line from Trieste to Charleston which Baron Von Pills has promised shall be put in operation within the next few weeks.

He replied that while nothing would please him better than to see the port of Charleston in communication with Europe through a steamship line, he could not approve the line from Trieste, for he said that it would primarily be an immigrant carrying line, there being but few products, in his estimation, which would be shipped from Trieste to the city of Charleston, and the immigrants would be of the most objectionable class—the kind that South Carolina does not need and that would injure rather than build up the State.

Huntsville, Ala., September 19.—While his bride of an hour was being taken away from him by her father, Richard Oldfield was held so tightly by the negro cook at his boarding house that effective resistance was impossible.

Oldfield swore out a warrant against his father-in-law for trespass, but before it was served a reconciliation was effected and the bride was given into the keeping of the young husband.

Looney, the innocent friend who did only what he was asked to do, is the only participant in the affair that is not satisfied with the arrangement of matters.
