### HEARST NOT A CANDIDATE.

Famous Reformer Says He Has No Idea of Running for Presidency.

New York, September 24.—In an interview published here, William Randolph Hearst takes occasion to deny that he is a candidate for the Presidency. He says: "I am not a candidate for the Presidency on the Independent League ticket, or any other ticket, and I cannot conceive of any conditions under which I would be willing to become a candidate." This determination, he adds, is "not because of any feeling of pique or disappointment at the result of the late election. I am well satisfied as a private citizen and to labor through the league, and through the election of others to promote the principles I believe in. I dislike holding office and I dislike particularly being placed in a position where the sincerity of my principles can be questioned through campaigning for some office that I do not want, and I would only consent to hold through a sense of public duty as I would serve on a jury."

### Letter to J. W. Lee, Walhalla, S. C.

Dear Sir: Not one man in ten knows whether he's wasting money or not when he paints. It depends on the paint.

### ACCUSED OF KILLING BRIDE.

Young Man and His Mother Arrested on Terrible Charge.

Philadelphia, September 25.—Mrs. Sarah Eichenlaub and her son Russell, aged 22 years, were committed to prison by the coroner to-day, charged with murdering Mrs. Mary E. Eichenlaub, aged 21 years, the six weeks' bride of young Eichenlaub. It is charged that she was poisoned with cyanide of potassium on June 23. She was stricken on the night of that date and died within a few minutes.

A paper containing particles of cyanide of potassium was found in the house and the city chemist, who made an analysis of the viscera taken from the body of the dead girl, declared she had been poisoned by a large dose of cyanide of potassium. Mother and son were each employed in institutions where they could secure the deadly poison.

At to-day's inquest evidence was presented showing that the young wife had been badly treated by her husband and mother-in-law.

### Gigantic Deal in Florida Land.

Atlanta, September 24.—J. P. Williams, of Savannah, who has been here for several days ill, gave out a statement this afternoon of one of the largest land deals ever negotiated in this section of the South. Mr. Williams is president of the J. P. Williams Land Company, of Florida, and vice president of the Georgia, Florida and Alabama Railroad Company. He said this afternoon that the land company, of which he is president, has just closed a real estate deal by which they have sold to a New York syndicate, headed by a man by the name of Pope, a tract of 40,000 acres of Florida land for \$300,000. He said the deal was practically a cash transaction.

Resolved 1. That the capital stock of the Westminster Knitting Mills be increased to \$40,000.00, the amount of such increase being \$20,000.00, in addition to the \$20,000.00 of capital stock now authorized and duly issued; that said increase of capital stock shall be divided into 400 shares of par value of \$50.00 each.

2. That such increase of capital stock shall be designated as Preferred Stock and have the following preferences and conditions, to wit: Said Preferred Stock shall be entitled to a cumulative preferred dividend at the rate of 7 per cent per year. It shall be preferred in the event of liquidation of the corporation to the extent of its par value and accrued dividends. The holders of such Preferred Stock shall have and enjoy the right to vote on the same basis as the holders of common stock.

3. The Common Stock shall be subject to all the rights and preferences of said Preferred Stock, and shall be entitled to all of the assets of the corporation after the redemption of all the said Preferred Stock.

It was further Resolved, That a meeting of the Stockholders of the Westminster Knitting Mills be called on FRIDAY, the 25th day of October, 1907, at 3 p. m., at the office in the Park Building at Westminster, for the purpose of considering said resolution calling for increase of the capital stock, with certain preferences and conditions, as set forth in the foregoing resolution.
