### Man Kills Wife in Nashville.

Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 8.—This afternoon Frank Click, a machinist, 25 years of age, shot his wife, Mrs. Ruth Click, three times, one bullet piercing her heart, killing her instantly. He then shot himself through the head, and lies dying at the city hos-pital. The tragedy occurred on Bilbo avenue, in the home of a negress, where Mrs. Click had taken refuge, the murdered woman falling across a bed in the room. \* A portion of a bed in the room. \* A portion of Click's brains were scattered upon the floor where he fell. Domestic troubles are assigned as the cause. Mrs. Click was an unusually handsome woman, about 23 years old, and had been divorced from a former husband. She and Click were mar-ried last July, and went to Memphis to live. She returned to Nashville some two weeks ago, going to the home of her father, W. N. Biblo, a wealthy real estate owner. Click rewealthy real estate owner. Click returned last night, and at his request Mrs. Click met him this afternoon on Bilbo avenue, near the scene of the killing. After a brief conversation with him she suddenly ran, with Click pursuing her. ## Negro Kills Georgia Policeman.

Midville, Ga., Dec. 8 .- Town Mar-Brinson was killed by a negro here this afternoon. The negro killed the marshal without any provoca tion. The negro, with others of his race was on the street, and was mak ing a disturbance. The marshal told the negro he must be quiet, and ordered him to appear in the city court to-morrow morning. As the officer was turning away the negro pulled a pistol, thrust the weapon against the officer's body, and fired three times. The officer fell to the sidewalk and died almost instantly. The negro A posse is in pursuit, and if captured he will probably be lynched.

Crazed Negro Shot Seven People. Augusta, Ark., Dec. 6.—Crazed by cocaine, Wash Mussay, a negro, ran amuck here early to-day, shooting seven white persons, two of whom were women.

The negro was finally corralled in the court house yard and shot to death by a posse, fighting until he fell, literally riddled with bullets. One of Mussay's victims will die.
