in Kentucky-Republican Candidate Beats Bickham L, Four Votes.

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 28.-Former Governor Wm. O. Bradley, a Republican, was to-day elected United States Senator after an exciting joint session of the General Assembly, re-ceiving four Democratic votes in ad-dition to the votes of all Republicans

It had been held from the begin-It had been held from the begin-ning of the contest over six weeks ago, that a majority of a quorum was sufficient for an election. With 126 members present to-day it required 64 votes to elect. The votes of four Democrats who have steadily refus-ed to vote for former Governor Beckham were transferred to-day from the various Democrats on whom they had sought to make their party as-rociates unite to the Republican cau-cus nominee and his election prompty followed.
