**HENRY BROWN IN TROUBLE.**

**Arrested Saturday—Suspected of Connection with Emerson Murder.**

Last Saturday Henry Brown, colored, was arrested and lodged in the jail in Walhalla. For some time Brown has been shadowed, and at last sufficient evidence that he knows a good deal about the death of Robert C. Emerson was secured to justify his arrest. Those working on the case are keeping their own counsel, and but little is known as to just what steps are to be next taken. Brown, however, will be held pending other developments in the case, which are expected to take place in the next few days.

It has all along been the general opinion that Robert Emerson was murdered, though some have held steadily to the belief that he fell from the Blue Ridge trestle in Walhalla and was killed by the fall. The fact, however, that he was known to have had considerable money on his person the evening before his lifeless body was found near the trestle, and the further fact that when his body was found there was but a small amount of change in his pockets, have given almost unmistakable ground for the belief that Emerson met with foul play at the hands of parties unknown to the coroner's jury at the time of the inquest. Developments that will implicate three or four parties besides Brown, and these, it is said by some, white men, are expected to follow close upon Brown's arrest.

M. C. Long, Esq., has worked untiringly on this case, and with some valuable assistance from the outside, has been instrumental in bringing about the results so far obtained. He, with others, has held to the murder theory all along.

It is to be hoped that the guilty parties can be brought to justice, and that speedily. The murder, if murder it was, of Emerson was a most brutal one. A heavy blunt piece of iron was found not far from the place where his body was found lying in the mud near the bottom of the fill at the trestle in Walhalla, and it is thought that he was struck with this and his body left there with the intention of giving the impression that he had been knocked from the trestle by a train. The position in which his body was found, however, did not bear out such a theory, and the wound on the head was such as to indicate that death came as a result of being struck with just such a weapon as the piece of iron found.

The developments in this case will be watched with no little interest by Walhalla people as well as by the citizens of Oconee. A considerable reward is offered for evidence to convict the guilty parties, the Governor, the Town Council of Walhalla, Salem Camp, Woodmen of the World, having offered rewards, and numerous citizens having contributed to a fund supplementing these.

**Eighteen Killed by Lightning.**

Berlin, June 12.—Six persons were killed, 17 severely and 80 slightly injured by lightning which struck among a party of excursionists this evening. The excursionists had taken shelter in an iron-fenced building in Jungfernheide from the most violent thunderstorm which has been experienced in Berlin for years. Many telephone and telegraph wires were leveled by the storm, and many residences damaged.

Seven deaths occurred from lightning at Breslau to-day, which brings the total in the province of Silesia up to 18 fatalities in three days.

**Flew From New York to Philadelphia.**

New York, June 13.—Charles K. Hamilton arose from Governor's Island in an aeroplane this morning and sped without a break 88 miles to Philadelphia in a successful cross-country flight under the auspices of the New York Times and the Philadelphia Ledger. He made the trip in one hour and 51 minutes, leaving Governor's island at 7.35 and landing at Philadelphia at 9.36.
