CANDIDATES COUNT THE COST. NOMINATED FOR GOVERNOR.

Georgia Convention Endorses Hoke Smith for Presidency.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 1.—Former Governor Hoke Smith "came back" politically to-day, when he was nominated for Governor of Georgia and endorsed for the Presidency of the United States in 1912, by the State Democratic Convention here.

Some disorder attended the presentation of Governor Brown's name as a candidate for the gubernatorial nomination.

Debate Griffith, of Haralson county, who made the nominating speech, was three times stopped by jubilant Smith shouters, finally leaving the floor.

Smith leaders made one last appeal to their men to be quiet and Griffith was brought back to resume his speech.

He then announced that he had given the only copy of it to a newspaper man, and could not finish. Enough of the speech already had been made, however, to place the Governor's name in nomination.

Tariff Law Denounced. The platform, which was unanimously adopted, denounced and condemned the Payne-Aldrich tariff law, together with the Republican administration, for its "complete breach of faith with the American people."

The platform declares the Republican administration revised the tariff upward instead of downward, as promised, and increased burdens were imposed. In part the platform declares:

"So monstrous a fraud has been practiced on the American people that no further demonstration is needed of the fact that the Republican party can never be trusted to give relief from tariff burdens."

World Disfranchise Ignorant. The disfranchisement of the ignorant and purchasable vote is endorsed and one plank urges the same protection for foreign and domestic corporations as is accorded the individual.

A law prohibiting lobbying and the elimination of corporations from politics is strongly urged. A complete revision of rates to and from the ports is endorsed and the platform unqualifiedly declares that the State, with an extensive ocean front, with four excellent ports, should receive the benefits of such a situation, and declares that the "arbitrary and excessive rates now exacted by the carriers are unjust and deprive the people of Georgia of their natural advantages."

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RESULTS IN THE STATE. State Executive Committee Declares Result of the First Primary.

Columbia, Sept. 3.—The State Democratic Executive Committee met last night in the office of the Secretary of State at the State House and declared the official results of the recent primary election.

The following were declared to be in the second race:

- For Governor, Cole L. Blease, C. C. Featherstone. For Adjutant General, W. W. Moore, J. M. Richardson. For Railroad Commissioner, James Canler, O. C. Scarborough. Those Elected.

The following were declared as having been elected on the first primary:

- Lieutenant Governor—Charles A. Smith, Attorney General—J. Fraser Lyon, Secretary of State—R. M. McCown, Comptroller General—A. W. Jones, Superintendent of Education—J. E. Swearingin, State Treasurer—R. H. Jennings. These are declared the nominees of the Democratic party.

The following were declared the nominees for Congress from the various districts:

- First District—George S. Legare, Third District—Wyatt Aiken, Fourth District—Jos. T. Johnson, Fifth District—D. E. Finley, Seventh District—A. P. Lever. A second primary is ordered from the following districts: Second District—James F. Byrnes and Jas. O. Patterson, Sixth District—J. E. Ellerbe and P. A. Hodges.
