

PROTRACTED MEETING CLOSES.

Seventy New Names Added to the List of Members at Walhalla.

With the service at the Walhalla Methodist church last night the protracted services were brought to a close. The meetings were largely attended throughout and a deep interest was manifested by the people of Walhalla and surrounding community. Rev. S. R. Belk, D. D., of Atlanta, conducted the meeting throughout, assisted by Rev. A. E. Driggers, the local pastor. The meeting was characterized by a strong and forceful presentation of the Scriptures by Rev. Belk, and the visible results have been far beyond the expectations of the pastor and officials of the church. Great and lasting good is hoped for. Seventy new members have been added to the membership of the local Methodist church by profession of faith and by letter. And it is expected that a score or more will unite with the other denominations of the town.

The meeting was opened Monday night of last week, when the first service was held preparatory to the dedication of the church on last Sunday morning. This service was an interesting and very impressive one, and aside from the people of Walhalla there were many from nearby points to take active part in it. The service proper was in charge of Rev. Dr. Belk, who was assisted by Rev. Mr. Driggers. The church building was presented to the Conference by the trustees of the congregation, after which, with impressive ceremony, Rev. Mr. Belk and his assistants dedicated the building to the service of God. An admirable music program was rendered in connection with the dedication service, which will long be remembered by those present as one of the most impressive and inspiring ever held in Walhalla.

Sunday morning, at the Sunday school hour, a decision service was held. At this service twenty-five members of the Sunday school decided for the Lord and joined the church. The scene was very impressive and will linger long in the minds of those who were permitted to witness the ceremony.

All denominations of the town have taken an active part and interest in the meeting, and to this fact, which is an index to the good fellowship and feeling of all the denominations, is due in large part the great results attained. The pastors and members of all denominations have been constantly mingling together in all the services. The Methodist church is to be congratulated upon the excellent work begun upon the eve of occupancy of their new church building. It has been occupied for several months by both church and Sunday school, owing to the fact that the old building was in such bad repair that occupancy could not be delayed until the time set for dedication of the new building.

E. R. HORTON'S GREAT WORK.

Bulwinkle Hill Has Been Transformed into a Residence Section.

For the past few years changes and improvements in Walhalla have been taking place one after the other so rapidly that it has long since ceased to cause our people to stop everything and stand and look on in open-mouthed wonder. Our people have become accustomed to see things change and improve and they take these things now as matters of course.

It has been many a day, however, since the whole side of the town has been transformed from a veritable wilderness into a desirable residence section, as has been done by E. R. Horton, representing the Anderson Real Estate and Investment Company. The term transformation does not adequately express the improvement that has been made in the old Bulwinkle Hill. Mr. Horton has simply made a new section of Walhalla. His work in reality adds to the town a large area that did not exist before.

His idea was primarily, of course, to make a good residence section of the large tract of land which his company some time since bought. This tract is well known as the Bulwinkle homestead. Beginning his work Mr. Horton knew the necessity for streets and John street was opened and graded by him to the north of Main street; North Broad street, (heretofore a wilderness) was opened to its full width of 200 feet, and Johnson and East Boundary streets were likewise opened in full width north of Main street, running entirely through the Bulwinkle tract, intersecting on the other side with the public roads leading to good sections outlying. Aside from the opening of these streets laid out in the plan of the town, Mr. Horton has also provided for ample and convenient streets through the section opened and laid off by him for residence lots. A winding driveway traverses the entire section east and west, and this is on a three per cent grade, so that one can walk or drive the entire length of the property from the lowest part to the highest and never realize that he has ascended a hill.

The lots have been laid off with a view to convenience and desirability for residences, and many of those who have visited the place are of the opinion that they can with but little expense be made ideal home places. In fact, that is just what is going to happen over on Bulwinkle Hill. It is the residence section of the town for the near future, and within the next few months there will be hammers and saws busily putting together the structures that will house many citizens. It is worth any one's time and trouble to go over and see all that has been done.

This work on Mr. Horton's part is going to result in great good to Walhalla as a whole and to her citizens individually. To-day there is scarcely a vacant house in town, and during the past six months a dozen families have either remained in other places or moved to other parts simply because they could not rent homes or buy property low enough to justify their moving to Walhalla. Mr. Horton's plan does away with the feature of high priced property. On the 20th of October these lots are going to be sold, and he has set no price on them. The purchaser will do that when he buys. The lots will be sold at auction to the highest bidder. This will give everybody an opportunity to get a home place at a reasonable price. Another feature that is a good one is the one that Mr. Horton has decided upon, permitting a small cash payment down at the time of purchase, the balance to be paid in small monthly installments. This means practically to paying rent for so many months, and at the last payment the building lot is yours. Walhalla has needed just such a sale of residence property for a long time, and the sale on the 20th of this month is going to benefit many a man who will hereafter own his own home and stop the rent drain.

No such improvement to a piece of property has been made here in many a year, and no such opportunity has heretofore been offered to our people to secure homes, as is now presented through the work of Mr. Horton. He has conferred a favor on the people of the town, and we hope that they will readily see the advantage of securing home property while it is cheap. A few years hence these same lots will be selling for double or triple what they will be sold for at this sale.

New York Has Big Fire.

New York, Oct. 3.—Fire in the vicinity of 24th street and 11th avenue early to-night swept an area of 500 by 300 feet, causing damage estimated at \$1,500,000. Chief Croker announced that it was the greatest burned area during his experience in New York city.

The flames spread to the storage warehouse of the United States Express Company. Firemen were attempting to save the branch depot of the Standard Oil Company.

The space swept comprises almost three acres of lumber yards, factories and stables on 11th avenue, 24th and 25th streets. For nearly three hours the fire was beyond the control of the fire department, and it was stopped at length by apparatus, which combined, threw water at the rate of 25,000 gallons a minute. Five hundred horses were rescued from the stables, and in spite of the size of the blaze and difficulty of fighting it, it was remarkably free from serious accident.

One fireman was badly hurt by a bucking hose and several others were less seriously hurt.

TAX NOTICE.

COUNTY TREASURER'S OFFICE, Walhalla, S. C., Oct. 5, 1910.

The books for the collection of State, County, School and Special Taxes for the fiscal year 1910 will be open from OCTOBER 15, 1910, to DECEMBER 31, 1910, without penalty, after which day one per cent penalty will be added on all payments made in month of January, 1911, and two per cent penalty on all payments made in the month of February, and seven per cent penalty on all payments made from the first day of March until the fifteenth day of March, 1911. After that day all taxes not paid will go into execution and be placed in the hands of the Sheriff for collection. Taxpayers owning property or paying taxes for others will please ask for a tax receipt in each Township or Special School District in which he or they may own property. This is very important, as there are so many Special School Districts. The tax levy is made up as follows:
