

There Are Thousands Homeless and Badly in Need of Food.

Naples, Italy, Oct. 27.—King Victor Emmanuel arrived here unannounced to-day. His coming was not wholly unexpected.

He was accompanied by his first aide, Gen. Brusati, Admiral Garelli and Count Mattiolo-Pasqualini, minister of the royal household.

The authorities were able to make a more definite estimate of the fatalities caused by the cyclone, tidal wave and eruptions of Mount Vesuvius and Mount Epomeo.

Known deaths are: Cetrara, 80; Vecece, 31; Majori, 20; Casamicciola, island of Ischia, 12; Amalfi, 10; Resina, 7; Madonna Grazi, 19; Minori, 4; Lacco Ameno, 3; Montecorvino, 2; Torre Del Greco, 1; total, 189.

Thousands are homeless, and the most serious problem now is to provide these with shelter, food and water. The movement of supplies is difficult, because in many places the roads have been washed out. Most of the towns requiring aid can be approached from the sea.

Admiral Leonard, minister of marine, had a narrow escape from death on the island of Ischia to-day. In attempting to get a close view of the effect of the eruption from Mount Epomeo, he approached too close to the bed of the volcanic stream and sank to his waist in mud. His plight was discovered by soldiers, who rescued him.

Putting on the Brakes.

A Columbus, Ohio, dispatch contains this by no means startling tidbit:

"The Paulding Times, one of the influential Democratic newspapers in that Democratic Northwest territory, has bolted the nomination of Judson Harmon for re-election as Governor of Ohio. It opposes Harmon on the ground that Harmon opposed Bryan in his three Presidential campaigns, and that he is a man whose every act as Chief Executive of the State has shown that he is in sympathy with corporations and their interests."

It serves to disclose Mr. Bryan's hand if that were needed, for Mr. Bryan laid his cards down face up last week when he declared that he would sooner vote for an insurgent or a progressive Republican than a standpat Democrat, though he really meant that he preferred any Republican to a Democrat like Harmon, of Ohio, or Wilson, of New Jersey.

The incident serves to make pertinent the following anecdote, that is exceedingly popular in circles made up of railroad trainmen:

"A brakeman who had not been long employed was going up a very steep grade on his first run. With unusual difficulty the engineer succeeded in reaching the top. At the station, looking out of his cab, the engineer saw the new brakeman and said, with a sigh of relief: 'I tell you what, my lad, we had a job to get up here, didn't we?' 'We certainly did,' said the brakeman, 'and if I hadn't have put on the brakes we'd have slipped back.'"

It is now become the office of Mr. Bryan to put on the brakes to stop the progress of his party on the way to success at the polls. He has openly bolted the nominee of his party for Governor in his own State, though that man was for many years one of his most ardent political supporters.

The political situation in Ohio is a picture of the general political chaos in 30 states or more. The Bryan men are in revolt against the Democratic ticket, and it would seem that the colored voters are ready to bolt the Republican State ticket.

November, quite likely, will bring surprises.

MURDER ATTEMPT AT GAFFNEY

Prof. W. J. Francis Felled by Blow While Counting Confed. Bills.

Gaffney, Oct. 27.—Gaffney is agog to-night with excitement over a bold attempt to rob and probably murder Will J. Francis, superintendent of the public schools of this city.

It seems, from what can be learned of the situation, that Prof. Francis was sitting in his room at his home alone, counting over a big roll of Confederate money. The blinds in the room were turned, affording a clear view to any one who might be passing. It is evident that some person or persons were outside the window and saw the money. They went to the back of the house and knocked on the door.

Prof. Francis, with his pistol in his hand, walked to the rear and opened the door, stepping out on the steps. When he did so, some one hit him on the head, knocking him to the ground. He was rendered unconscious and then an attempt was evidently made to cut him, as his belt and suspenders are cut in two places. He soon regained consciousness and heard the party climbing over a back fence. He shot at the fugitive three times and then arose, going over to the residence of R. A. Jones, next door, and when the door was opened fell into the house. He has now almost recovered and is able to walk, although his head is badly lacerated and bruised.

Officers were summoned from town and bloodhounds were secured, and now a strenuous search is being made by the officers and a posse of citizens. Prof. Francis is unable to state whether there was more than one assailant or not. He cannot say what he was struck with. The bloodhounds have caught the trail and the miscreants may be captured.

DIDN'T USE BOY AS SHIELD.

Coroner's Jury So Finds and Adolph Berg Goes Free.

New York, Oct. 27.—At the coroner's inquest into the death of 12-year-old Charles Fisher, who was shot in a fight between Biz Clark and Adolph Berg at Madison avenue and 103d street. Berg was exonerated of the charge of causing the boy's death by using him as a shield.

Policeman Meeney, of the East 10th Street station, said that Joseph Strauss, whom he found on the scene at the shooting, told him that Berg picked up the boy and used him as a shield from Clark's bullet. Strauss, who is a property man in a Harlem theater, denied this. Leon Mach, a harbor, said he was walking at the side of the boy. "Berg didn't touch him," he said. "I was between Berg and the boy when Clark fired the shot that killed Fisher."

Gussie Kuttner, a thirteen-year-old girl, and several other witnesses for the defendant testified that Berg didn't touch the boy. Acting District Attorney Bostwick said Berg would not be rearrested.

TO IRRIGATE FARM LANDS.

First Work in Richland County Under Direction of Government.

(Columbia Record.)

The first irrigation under direction of the national government in this State will be put into operation on the plantation of W. G. Childs, a few miles south of Columbia, on the Bluff road. Milo B. Williams, irrigation engineer of the department of agriculture, office of experiment stations, will arrive in the city about November 1st, to place the pumping plant on Mr. Childs' plantation.

The value of the work to be accomplished on the Childs and other plantations by the government is in tiding farmers over the droughty spell.

For Draining Lands.

In connection with the irrigation question, the State Farmers' Union, at its recent meeting, passed resolutions requesting Commissioner Watson to prepare a bill covering the whole question of drainage and irrigation. Commissioner Watson has set to work to prepare such a bill, which will embody the best of features from the acts in California, Oregon and other States where the question has met with consideration. The law to be drafted for South Carolina will not impose a necessary appropriation. The funds for drainage and other work are to come from the individual farmer desiring his lands so treated. The work will, however, be under the direction of a drainage commission.
