Golden Text: "It is good neither to eat flesh, nor to drink wine, nor anything whereby thy brother stumbleth." Rom. xiv:21.

- (2.) What did Daniel propose for his food?
- (3.) What are the advantages and disadvantages (1) of a meat diet, (2) of a vegetable diet?
- (4.) Is there any reason to believe that God originally meant man to be a meat eater?
- (5.) If meat is necessary for strength, how do you account for the strength of the horse and the elephant, as both are vegetarians?
- (6.) Is there any reason to think that the craving, or desire for meat is an artificial appetite?
- (7.) What evidence is there that a purely vegetable diet would increase the health and longevity of the people?
- (8.) Verse 9—Did God in some supernatural way cause the prince of the eunuchs to love Daniel, or in any other way than through Daniel's lovable manner?
- (9.) Does God turn the hearts of people to love or favor good Christians wholly apart from their actual attractions?
- (10.) Verse 10—Which people are the healthier, those who have abundance of rich food and who eat all they can or those who have plain food and eat only enough to give them sufficient strength for their work?
- (11.) Verses 11-13—What should be our rule as to the kind and quantity of food we eat?
- (12.) Which class in the community is generally the healthier, the rich or those respectable people who have to struggle to make ends meet?
- (13.) Take one hundred persons who drink nothing but water and another hundred persons who drink intoxicating liquor and compare their probable condition as to (a) health, (b) wealth, (c) happiness.

- (14.) Who were Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah?
- (15.) Verses 14-15—What was the result of the test made upon these three Hebrew young men, in eating a strictly vegetable diet, and drinking nothing stronger than water?
- (16.) Should this test from experience bind our conscience, and cause us to eat and drink as they did? Why, or why not?
- (17.) Verse 16—What in our day are the chief evils of gluttony, and what are the chief evils of drunkenness?
- (18.) To what extent would the world be better if the use of intoxicating liquor as a beverage could be stopped? (This is one of the questions that may be answered in writing by members of the club.)
- (19.) Verses 17-21—To what extent may all men develop their ability by increasing their knowledge?
- (20.) Why is it not possible for all persons with sufficient study to become first-rank artists, orators, poets and scientists, or to attain to supernatural powers like Daniel and his companions?
- (21.) Were the learning and wisdom of these four young men acquired, or the gifts of God?
- (22.) Where do you draw the line as to the possibilities of present spiritual or supernatural powers?

END OF THE "LONE STAR"

Propose to Divide State of Texas Into Three States.

The embroglio over the prohibition election in Texas, which was carried from the polls to the State Legislature, called to discuss financial matters, is producing some of the greatest sensations in the history of the State. Recently the prohibitionist members of the Legislature proposed a new constitution for the State that would contain State-wide prohibition. This was in the form of a resolution introduced in the Senate providing for the calling of a constitutional convention the first Monday in March, 1913. The wording of the resolution was that "the delegates are to be chosen by the voters of the State qualified to vote under the existing laws for members of the Legislature." This would eliminate the negro vote. The resolution went to a committee, where it still is.
This piece of thunder was immediately met by the anti-prohibitionist members, who sprang the greatest sensation of all, providing to divide the State of Texas into three great Commonwealths, allowing North Texas to be divided into two States and South Texas composing the third. In this way, they said, North Texas, which is "dry," could vote State-wide prohibition without opposition, while South Texas, which is solidly "wet," would not be harassed by politics of other sections. The matter has not reached the resolution stage, yet it is the sentiment of the solid anti-prohibition delegates in the Legislature.

MAN KILLED NEAR KILLIANS.
L. W. Ealsler Placed in Jail—E. F. Clever Dead.
(The State, 28th.)

Lewis W. Ealsler, a farmer who resides near Killians, was placed in the Richland county jail yesterday on the charge of killing E. F. Clever. The shooting took place in the yard of Mr. Ealsler Saturday night at 9.30 o'clock. Coroner Walker held an inquest yesterday and found that Clever came to his death as the result of a gun-shot wound by Mr. Ealsler. Mr. Clever was brought to the Columbia hospital yesterday morning in a serious condition. He died shortly after reaching the hospital. According to the testimony brought out at the inquest E. F. Clever stopped in front of the home of Lewis Ealsler Saturday night about 9 o'clock. Witness said that Clever was drinking. He tried to get into the yard by tearing down a fence. It was stated that Ealsler, who was seated on the front veranda of his home with his wife and a cousin, hearing the noise, went out to see who was trying to tear down the fence. He took Clever to come through the gate.
After talking with Ealsler for some time it was stated by witness that Clever started to leave. Ealsler told him to go home. Witness said that Clever commenced to curse and drew his knife. Ealsler fired one shot over his head. The fire, it is said, struck Clever and Ealsler fired the fatal shot. Clever was wounded in the chest.
The case was reported to Coroner Walker Saturday night. He was also informed that a physician was needed and that Clever might recover if given the proper treatment. Coroner Walker secured a physician and left for Killians late Saturday night. Clever was hurried to the Columbia hospital, where he died shortly after arriving.
It is said that Ealsler had never met Clever.

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ENDED WOMAN'S SUFFERING.

Shakers Arrested for Causing Member's Death by Poison.

Kissimmee, Fla., Sept. 1.—Egbert Gillett and Elizabeth Sears, members of the Shaker colony, at Ashton, near this city, were placed in jail here last night, charged with causing the death of Sadie Marchant, another member of the colony, by the use of poison.
Sadie Marchant died August 22d, and was buried on the colony land by Gillett and a woman known as Sister Amanda. The officers were notified of the occurrence, and after an investigation arrested Gillett and the Sears woman. They admit giving the poison, asserting that the victim was hopelessly ill with tuberculosis and wanted to die and escape from her sufferings. They acceded to her appeals and gave her chloroform.
The dead woman was 34 years of age; Gillett is 53, and the woman who is implicated with him was 74 yesterday.

Farmer Contracts Cattle Disease.
Estherwood, La., Aug. 31.—Bruce Broussard, a farmer, is suffering with charbon, a disease fatal to cattle, the disease having been contracted by Broussard while removing the hide from the carcass of a cow killed by the disease.
