ONE LAWYER KILLS ANOTHER. Thos. Kallum Shoots H. Whitaker at Pilot Mountain, N. C. Charlotte, N. C., Oct. 12.—Thos. Kallum, lawyer and editor, shot and killed Henry Whitaker, a brother attorney, upon the main street of Pilot Mountain this afternoon. The homicide grew out of an old feud. Whitaker is said to have been advancing on Kallum with a knife when the fatal shot was fired. The dead man leaves a family. Whitaker was 63 years old, tall and well preserved for a man of his years. Kallum is only 23 and a cripple, walking with the aid of a cane. He is editor of the Pilot Mountain News. Whitaker, it is said by eye-witnesses, advanced upon Kallum with an open knife. The latter warned him to stop, and after some hesitation shot Whitaker through the head, killing him instantly. Kallum surrendered immediately.
