Sections of the bark of the tree, 18 to 20 inches in length and several inches wide, were knocked a distance of about 100 feet against the barn to the south of the residence, and some smashed through the windows in the residence, 30 or more feet to the northeast. A peculiarity of the stroke was that the lightning seemed to expend its energy in making exit through the roots of the tree, splitting them into shreds and tearing up the ground. No material damage was done except to the tree.

—Bishop Wm. A. Guerry and Rev. W. N. Tillinghast conducted services at St. John's Episcopal church last Monday night at 8.30 o'clock. There was a good congregation present to hear the Bishop preach, and he delivered a sermon full of overflowing with truths that furnished great range for thought and contemplation. The service was greatly enjoyed as a whole, and excellent music was furnished through the courtesy of members of the choir, of other churches. At the close of the service a short congregational meeting was held looking to a better arrangement for services in the future. Plans were laid for a continuation of services on the second and fourth Sundays in each month, as heretofore, but in the future one Sunday each month will be devoted entirely to the Walhalla church, thus giving three services a month. This plan will be taken up with the month of June and continued during October, when some other arrangement will be made for the winter months. Rev. W. N. Tillinghast, of Greenville, will continue to serve this charge in connection with his work in his home city. Arrangement was also made for lay services on the Sundays when the rector will be absent, and Capt. V. F. Martin was commissioned by the Bishop as the lay reader for the Walhalla congregation. Hereafter the church will be open for services each Sunday, and the first lay service will be held next Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. It will also be the endeavor of the congregation to hold Sunday school services regularly in the future, and next Sunday morning at 10 o'clock each member of the congregation is expected to be present at the church, and to bring every child in the Episcopal families. The Episcopal church here is numerically weak, and united action is essential. The public generally and members of other denominations will be most cordially welcomed to any and all services at St. John's Episcopal church.
