Gaston Hall, of the Presbyterian College, Clinton, is spending his vacation at home. He will return to his studies on January 2d.

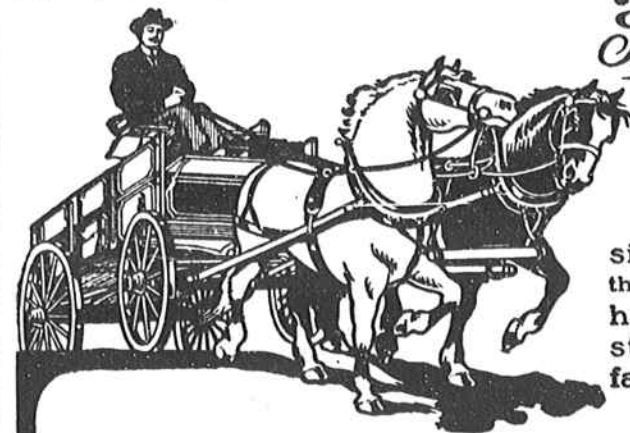
