

ANDERSONIANS AND RADIUM.

Mrs. S. Bleckley and Thos. C. Walton Have Been Treated.

(Anderson Intelligencer.) While the entire country is talking of the wonderful results that are being obtained from the use of radium in the treatment of a number of skin diseases...

Mrs. S. Bleckley, one of Anderson's most lovable women, is just back from her third trip to Baltimore, where she took the radium treatment for the disease of her face. This was the third time that Mrs. Bleckley had undergone the application of the radium, and it is said by her physicians and members of her family that there seems to be a decided improvement in her condition.

When Mrs. Bleckley first entered Dr. Kelly's sanitarium in Baltimore for the radium treatment she was given a 24-hour application, which left her very weak. It seemed that the substance had almost sapped her vitality, and she was some time in recovering from the effects of this.

Radium is a mineral substance, coming in small grains like sand. As readers of the newspapers know, it is a very rare substance, and the cost of it is hardly less than fabulous.

In administering the treatment the physicians first place the precious grains in a small tubing, then in a lead-covered tubing, and then a small bundle, like a pillow, is made of cotton and the tube is wrapped up. This is then applied to the portion of the body affected and which is to be treated.

The application of the radium at the time is not painful, but after the patient has finished with the actual application the pain experienced from the burns and blisters is said to be most acute, and many suffer terribly from the after-effects.

Mrs. Bleckley, who is 74 years of age, is one of the two oldest patients ever subjected to the radium treatment. She and a gentleman from Iowa, considerably older than the Anderson lady, hold the record for older people being treated, hospital authorities saying that for the most part the patients who come to be treated are younger people.

Some time is necessary to build up the system after the treatment is given, and it is, therefore, still uncertain as to what benefit Mrs. Bleckley will derive from her last visit to Dr. Kelly's institution.

CLOVER, ALSIKE, ALFALFA.

Sow Clover Seed on Fall Sown Oat and Wheat Crops.

(Wood's Crop Special.)

The best time for seeding red clover is in the spring, and it can be sown to excellent advantage either by itself or on fall-sown grain the end of February or during March. Very satisfactory stands are obtained by sowing clover seed on wheat, oats or other grains which may have been sown in the fall, and then running a sharp-tooth harrow crosswise over the field, so as to give the seed a light covering. Running the harrow over it does not injure the grain crop, but increases the yield, really acting as a cultivation to the crop.

Clover seed requires a good, firm seed bed, and sowing in this way, it is sown under ideal conditions for securing a good stand. All throughout the West it is the regular custom to sow clover seed in the spring on practically all fall-sown wheat or other grain crops.

Sowing Alsike Clover and Alfalfa in Mixture with Red Clover.

Red clover is considered as the standard forage and soil-improving crop combined, and is more widely and generally used than any other crop for this purpose. The quantity sown to the acre is usually ten to twelve pounds. It is an excellent plan when seeding to also sow two or three pounds of alsike clover to the acre; and if it is desired to inoculate the soil for alfalfa, a seeding of three to five pounds of alfalfa is desirable. Where these three clovers are sown in mixture, 8 pounds of red clover, 3 pounds of alsike clover and 3 pounds of alfalfa is the quantity usually sown to the acre. The advantages of sowing alsike clover are more on the lines of crop insurance than otherwise, as alsike clover is surer to give a stand, and also stands more adverse conditions of dry or cold weather than other clovers.

Advantages of Sowing Alfalfa in Clover and Grass Mixtures.

The sowing of alfalfa with both clovers and grasses is likely to increase the yield considerably, and the sowing of alfalfa in mixtures with other grasses and clovers is one of the best ways of testing as to whether it is adapted to your land, and also of thoroughly inoculating your land, in case it is desired to put the land down to a pure alfalfa crop afterwards.

Orangeburg Man Killed.

Cope, Jan. 26.—W. A. Price, a white carpenter, 45 or 50 years of age, of Orangeburg, was instantly killed about 7.35 o'clock to-night about a mile and a quarter from Cope, in the direction of Orangeburg. It is believed that he was struck by Atlantic Coast Line train No. 36, the fast "Palmetto Limited," from Augusta to Florence, as Price, it is said, was seen sitting on the crossties just a short time before the train passed the point where his body was later found beside the track. It is also stated that an empty whiskey bottle was found near Price's body.

Price was in Cope to-day on business, and left town late this afternoon, walking in the direction of Orangeburg. It is thought that he sat on the crossties to rest and perhaps fell asleep or was in such condition that he did not hear the approaching train, which makes a fast schedule without a stop between Denmark and Orangeburg. Cope is between these two points and about ten miles from Orangeburg. The victim of tonight's tragedy was married and leaves a family.

Passengers Capture Train Robber.

Zanesville, Ohio, Jan. 28.—An attempt to rob Baltimore an Ohio passenger train No. 105 was frustrated near here early to-day by passengers.

Four men boarded the train at Bellaire, Ohio, and one of them attempted to rob a woman passenger while the other three demanded money from other passengers.

Persons in the car went to the woman's assistance in such numbers that the robber was captured while the other three jumped from the train. The man apprehended gave his name as Harry Warner, but refused to tell anything else about himself.

MAKE YOUR TAX RETURNS.

Auditor's Office, Oconee County, S. C. December 16th, 1913.

The Auditor's office will be open to receive returns of real and personal property for taxation from the 1st day of January, 1914, to the 20th day of February, inclusive.

The Real Estate—Lots and Buildings—are to be assessed this year. Tax-payers will be careful to list exactly the number of acres, number of lots and number of buildings on their returns, as the assessment made now will stand for the next four years.

The Township Assessors are required by law to list for all those who fail to make their own returns within the time required by law. Hence the difficulty of delinquents escaping the 50 per cent penalty, as well as the frequency of errors resulting from this practice. By all means make your own returns and thereby save expense and confusion.

All able-bodied men, 21 to 60 years of age, are taxable polls.

Mexicans Receive Pay.

El Paso, Texas, Jan. 26.—Although they are to be sheltered and fed indefinitely by the United States government, the Mexican soldiers from Ojinaga, who are interned at Fort Bliss, to-day received from their own government some of the pay due them before they crossed the Rio Grande.

Each Mexican soldier received \$5. his first pay for months, and according to Gen. Salvador Mercado, the commander, the last. None of the foreign soldiers were permitted to leave the reservation to spend the money.

An official census just completed by Col. Frederick Perkins shows that there are now 5,295 soldiers and refugees to be provided for by this government. Besides the six generals there are thirteen field officers of the regular Mexican army and fifteen volunteer field officers. Other officers total 204. The women number 1,237 and the children 552.

May Control Weather.

London, Jan. 24.—Sir Oliver Lodge, distinguished physicist, suggested to the Institute of Electrical Engineers to-day the possibility of obtaining some measure of control over the weather. If clearing weather, he said, was due to electricity, it might be imagined that man could acquire some control over the electrification of the atmosphere.

If it was desired to produce rain, why not send up a kite to reach the clouds? He believes that if enough electricity were discharged into the clouds the drops would behave there as they did in the laboratory—they would coalesce, and once that had happened, the process might be repeated and cause a shower.

When rain was wanted, the lecturer said, negative electricity should be sent up, and if fine weather was wanted, positive electricity.

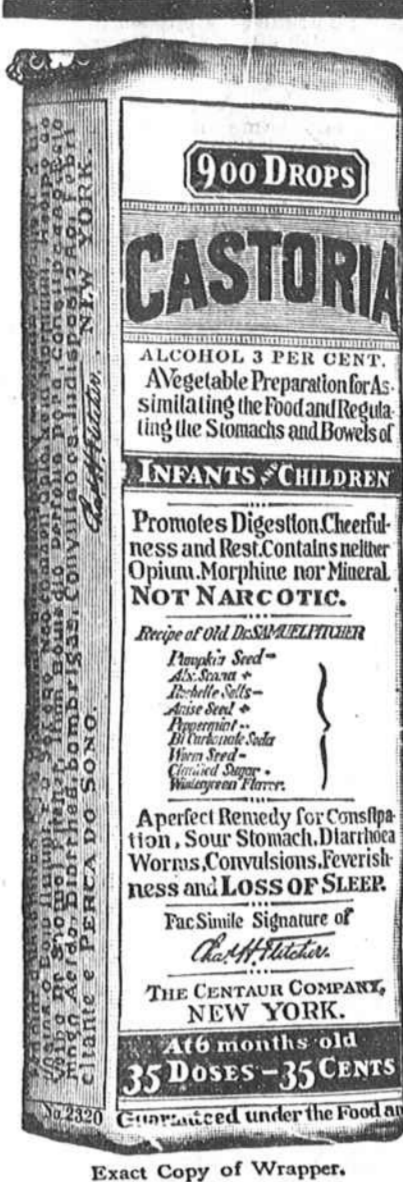
