American Boat Seized by British.

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 4.-A cablegram received here yesterday announced the seizure of the American schooner Laura C. Anderson by a British cruiser, which took her into Gibraltar. The schooner cleared from Newport News, Va., June 29th. for Melilla, Morocco, with a cargo of

The message, which was received by agents for the schooner, contained no further information. It requested that the consignee's name be cabled to the British admiralty. From this request the agents here assumed that the cargo was shipped "to order." If this is so, the agents declared, a mistake was made at Newport News in clearing the vessel. The clearance papers, they said, have contained the consignee's name. The coal was shipped by a New York

firm and the agents expected to forward the name as soon as they heard
