Aircraft Get Busy.

Aircraft have again broken the monotony of the western warfare. Sixty-two French aeroplanes flew over the Dellingen Iron Works, near Saarlouis, Rhenish Prussia, dropping 150 bombs, while a British aviator is reported to have dropped a bomb and destroyed a German submarine off Ostend. Brest-Litovsk Strong Fortress. The Russian fortress of Brest-Litovsk had been considered one of the strongest fortresses in Europe and was the southern base of the second Russian line of defenses, to which the armies of Grand Duke Duke Nicholas retreated after the fall of Warsaw. The citadel is situated on the Bug River and at the junction of several railways, 131 miles south of Grodno, and 120 miles due east of the Polish capital.

The storming of Brest-Litovsk is probably the most important military achievement since the fall of Warsaw three weeks ago to-day. The town, which had a population of about 50,000, was one of the most important depots for, and the distributing point of, military supplies

No Report to Germany.

The ambassador did not make pub-The Russians have not yet entered from Berlin on which he acted, but pressing the willingness of the German government to make fullest reparation if it is shown finally that the same terms as here, the Arabic was torpedoed without warning. So 7 the German admiralty has received no report from its submarines operating in the Arabic's vicinity. Further communications are expected from Berlin to the German ambassador and to the State Department from Ambassador Gerpassenger-carrying ships will be definitely discontinued, at least while the subject is under discussion. The crisis between the two countries is

regarded as having come into the realm of diplomacy.

More than Disavowal.

The German ambassador frankly stated after his interview with Mr. Lansing that his instructions embodied the declaration by the Berlin government that it would give full satisfaction to the American government, That, he declared, meant much more than a disavowal. The giving of satisfaction would depend upon the circumstances of the attack on the Arabic, he said. The German government did not know yet, he said, whether the Arabic was sunk

by a German submarine and without warning, but if investigation proves that to have been the case, Germany would make full reparation.



SEED FOR THE COVER CROP.

This Matter Will Soon Demand Attention-Vetch Seed Scarce.

(Clemson News Notes.)

It is time now to plan for next fall's sowings of winter cover crops, and farmers should advise themselves at once of the seed situation, as European war conditions have brought about certain peculiarities in this situation.

There will be little hairy vetch to be had in this country this year and hairy vetch is the only kind that Clemson College advises South Carolina farmers to sow. Oregon or common vetch does not do very well in this State. Most of the hairy vetch seed sown in this country comes from Russia and the war has cut off importations.

It will be possible, however, for South Carolina farmers to get plenty of burr clover seed, and they are advised to sow this and crimson clover for their winter legumes.

Fortunately, a large quantity of burr clover seed was made in this State this year and the extension division of Clemson College has the names of a number of farmers who have barr clover seed for sale. All who desire to purchase seed can get in touch with these farmers by writing to the extension division of Clemson College,

They should not delay about buying burr clover seed, however. The demand from outside is strong and the college has received many inquiries from Alabama, Mississippi and Georgia. One South Carolina farmer is now planning to ship a carload of burr clover seed to Alabama.

Farmers are not advised to delay purchasing in the hope that prices will be lower later in the season. The demand is so strong that it is not probable that prices will be lower than at present.

The strongest limiting factor in South Carolina agriculture is lack of humus and the most economical way to get humus in the soil is by growing winter legumes and turning under in spring. The growing and plowing winter legumes and turning under only put humus into the soil, but it will also add nitrogen and will thus mean a saving to farmers in the most expensive plant food element that they have to buy.

Brest-Litovsk, according to information compiled by the National Geographic Society, contained one of the oldest important fortresses in Northern Europe. The older fortifications were erected about one mile east of Brest-Litovsk and had a circumference of four miles. The field works were kept up to date and everything possible had been done to make them unconquerable. Brest-Litovsk was generally regarded in

The capitulation means, in the opinion of military observers, that the Russians will be forced to abandon their second line, which extended northward to the Baltic base of Riga. The fall of the fortress appeared inevitable several days ago, when the Austro-German forces succeeded in throwing troops from the left to the right bank of the River Bug, just northwest of Brest-Litovsk, after which five separate armies began a terrific onslaught on the Russian defenses. On Tuesday the army on the southwestern front succeeded in breaking through the advance positions of the fortress.
