

McLAURIN TO NEW YORK.

Presumably to Consider Matters in Cotton Situation.

Columbia, Sept. 30.—Senator John L. McLaughlin has been called to New York, presumably for a conference on the cotton situation.

Asked what made him say Germany was buying cotton, he said, "Well, I think it better not to say too much; business people don't want their affairs paraded in the newspapers."

It is magnificent the way the farmers are holding. The present advance is due to cheap money. Low prices in the fall have come heretofore from the contraction of credit.

Direct Sales. Col. Thackston said that "in the development of the State warehouse system we have just reached the really big thing in it—direct sales of cotton from the farm to the consumer."

"My plans at present have not been formulated, and I prefer to say nothing until after more mature deliberation and a more thorough acquaintance with the plans of the Federal government."

"There is no reason why, with the machinery which Mr. McLaughlin has perfected, to wit, the State warehouse system, that the farmers of this State cannot organize and control absolutely the sale of this year's cotton crop."

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TALKED DISTANCE 2,500 MILES.

Without Aid of Wire—Voice Transmission is Wonderful.

Washington, Sept. 29.—Long distance wireless telephone communication was accomplished for the first time to-day when experiments, extending over several months, culminated in successful transmission of the human voice by radio from Arlington, Va., to Mare Island, Cal., 2,500 miles away.

The experiments were conducted under direction of Capt. Bullard, chief of the navy's radio service, in co-operation with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company and the Western Electric Company.

Successful operation of a device for automatically transferring to the radio telephone conversations originating on wire circuits also was accomplished.

"The fact that the voices can be started on a land wire and automatically transmitted to a voice radio transmitter," said Secretary Daniels, "holds out hope that persons inland should readily be put in touch by telephone with others at sea through some central transmitting station."

The Navy Department's formal announcement follows:

"Secretary Daniels is pleased to announce the successful outcome of experiments which have been carried on for the last few months by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company in co-operation with radio stations under jurisdiction of the Navy Department by which long distance wireless telephony has been made possible."

COTTON RISE HELPS BUSINESS.

Improved Conditions Reported to the Federal Reserve Board.

Washington, Oct. 1.—Improved business conditions in practically all sections are reflected in reports from Federal reserve agents in the twelve districts, made public to-day by the Federal Reserve Board.

The three Southern districts report that present prices of cotton and efforts of the Federal board to finance the crop have had a beneficial effect on other lines.

With cotton at present prices, Richmonds reports a large part of the district's crops will move from first hands, and the consequent liquidation of seasonal trade obligations will be generally helpful.

Bright outlook in the cotton market in the Atlanta district, says the report, is an important factor. Railroads show considerable increase in freight traffic.

General conditions in the Dallas district are said to show some improvement over August. The Texas cotton crop is estimated at not more than 3,250,000 bales.

Life Sentence for Mendenhall.

Clearwater, Fla., Oct. 1.—J. J. Mendenhall, convicted here last week of the murder of Miss Sue Elliot on the night of July 2 last, to-day was sentenced to imprisonment for life.
