Young Farmer Shoots at Fiancee. Killed by Her Father.

Molena, Ga., Dec. 26-Lovic Stribing, a young planter, at daybreak this morning called at the home of his flancee, with whom he had been dancing at a Christmas ball a few hours before, and tried to kill the girl by firing at her with a shotgun. His aim was poor and before he could shoot again the girl's father, John R. Heaton, killed him.

He called her out on the veranda and asked her to kiss him goodbye for the last time. The girl noticed something strange in his manner and when she saw a shorgun leaning against the steps, ran, shricking, into the house, surang into her father's room and looked the

Stribling followed the screaming girl, and, circling through the hall and dining room, appeared at another door to the room in which she had taken refuge. He aimed the shotgun at her and fired, but she had stepped aside and the shot went wild.

Mr. Heaton, aroused by his daughter's cries, then rushed up and fired at Stribling before the latter could shoot again. The young man fell in the doorway, where he died ten minutes later.

Stribling secured the shotgun early Sunday morning from his brother, who lives about half a mile from where Stribling resided with his father. In borrowing the gun, Stribling said he wanted to kill a hawk
