Beaufort Gets Next Meeting-To Fight Against Tuberculosis.

York, June 9. Beaufort will have the pleasure of entertaining the 1917 convention of the South Carolina Press Association. It was so decided by the convention in session here this afternoon. To-day was devoted to business matters of interest only to newspaper workers, although a large number of York people attended the two-day sessions, and an audience that packed the York opera house heard Dr. Talcott Williams, director of the Pulitzer School of Journalism of Columbia University, deliver an inspiring and instructive address on "The American Press."

The Press Association promised to co-operate in every way in a campaign against tubevculosis. The movement was presented to the association by Mrs. Annie I. Rembert, of Columbia, field secretary for the State Board of Health. She is making a campaign in the interest of the South Carolina Sanitarium.

The following resolution in part

"Resolved, That this association pledge its support and co-operation of the movement towards the eradication of tuberculosis, and that it give its aid to this work now being carried on under the auspices of the State Board of Health of South Carolina."

Democrats Face Peace, Prohibition and Petticoats in Politics.

St. Louis, June 11. Women suffragists began pouring into St. Louis to-day, bringing the argument that the Democratic National Convention should take advantage of the failure of the Republicans to endorse suffrage by constitutional amendment. insert a full-fledged equal rights plank in the Democratic platform, and thereby capture the large woman vote in the suffrage States.

Many political observers predict that the most interesting fight of the convention will center on the suffrage issue. Peace and prohibition, of course, will attract much attention, but if the picturesque appeals to the delegates, as the organizers of the suffrage display planned for the week insist that it must, the two former issues soon will be overshadowed by the dominating influence of the question of equal rights.

Neither delegates, leaders nor crowds will be permitted until the last moment of the convention to forget suffrage. There will be street parades and other demonstrations, and 21 women will sit in the Democratic convention. Thirteen will be delegates and eight are alternates.

Among the delegates are women prominent in all walks of life, not a few of whom have at least State-wide reputations in the business and educational as well as the social world.

Italian Cabinet Resigns.

London, June 11.-The Italian eabinet, healed by Premier Salandra, resigned to-day. This action resulted from the failure of the chamber of deputies yesterday to pass a vote of confidence in the government after the presentation of the budget of the ministry of the interior.

A Rome dispatch received here today by wireless said the ministerial erisis would soon be ended. All political parties, it was contended, favored a national ministry containing Baron Sonino, the minister of foreign affairs, and the present military min-

CHARLESTON JURY AT WORK.

Thirteen True Bills Returned in the Noted Election Riot Case.

Charleston, June 9 .- On all of the 13 indictments arising from the election shooting cases of last October, the grand jury to-day returned true bills. The jury, however, in handing in all true bills, made a special presentment in which it informed the court that the concealed weapon cases were not separate individual cases from the others, but that all of the cases arose from an effort to fix the responsibility for the killing of Sidney J. Cohen, who was shot and killed during the committee room outbreak.

The true bills brought in the elecion shooting cases are as follows: George Rentiers, carrying concealed weapon; Frank Hogan, inciting riot; Edward McDonald, carrying concealed weapon; Jos. A. Black, carrying concealed weapon; W. S. Wingate, assault with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapon; J. J. Healey. carrying concealed weapon; Patrick Quinn, assault with intent to kill: J. H. Steencken, carrying concealed weapon; Henry J. Brown, assault and battery with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapon; James R. Cantwell, assault with intent to kill; F. E. Lafourcade, assault with intent to kill, and W. Turner Logan, carrying concealed weapon,

Drowned in Atlanta Lake.

(Constitution, 12th)

While hundreds of happy swimmers filled the lake at Piedmont Park, and thousands of spectators lined the shores at this popular resort Sunday afternoon, J. Scott Bates fell into the water and was drowned before help could reach him. It was the first fatal accident of the year.

Bates, who was well known at the park, and generally considered an excellent swimmer, was fully dressed at the time. He was standing on the bank, leaning over and washing his hands in the water, when he slipped and fell in. Before nearby bathers were able to reach the scene he had gone down, and when his body was pulled out on the bank, it was too

Spectators who witnessed the drowning state that Bates had evidently been drinking. In fact, he was released from the police barracks only a few hours before he was drowned, after spending the night in the lock-up on a charge of drunk and disorderly.

Bates leaves a wife and one little child. He is also survived by his fa-

Warspite's Escape Miraculous.

London, June 10 .- In proof of the statement of the British admiralty that the dreadnaught Warspite arrived safely in port after the North Sea battle, the commander of the warship himself received an Associated Press correspondent to-day and described his vessel's "miraculous escape" from the concentrated German

"I am still commander of the greatest battleship in the world, and bluejackets," said this officer, Capt. E. M. Phillpotts. "I am not surprised that there have been reports that the Warspite was sunk," he said, "as, from our position between our fleet and the German battleships, our escape from such a fate was simply miraculous. Several times we disappeared from sight in the smoke and spray. Even some of our own officers on other ships believed the battleship had sunk. As we left the fighting line we disappeared in a complete veil of spray,"

Extending Blockade to Greece.

Athens, Greece, June 11 .- The British minister of Greece to-day, in the name of the entente powers, presented to the Greek government the demands constituting the conditions upon which the blockade would be raised. As an outcome of the energetic measures adopted by the allied governments, the demobilization of a part of the Greek army is already under way.

France Holds Greek Steamers.

Marseilles, France, June 11,-Nine Greek steamers in this port are being detained on an order from the French ministry of marine. Other Greek vessels in the Mediterranean are being brought in as a consequence of the blockade of the entente powers against Greece.

EVANGELIST TOM LEITOH DEAD. Passed Away Suddenly at Columbia Hospital Sunday Night.

(The State, 12th.)

Rev. Thomas H. Leitch, formerly superintendent of the Oliver Gospel Mission, died suddenly at a Columbia hospital last night about 10.30

For 30 years Mr. Leitch had been an evangelist of the Methodist Episcopal church, and in this capacity had been throughout South Carolina and in many sections of the United States from New York to Denver, and in the South.

Mr. Leitch, who became editor of The Way of Faith about a year ago, succeeding Rev. James M. Pike, was born in London, England, in 1850. He came to America at the age of three years, and up until three years ago had spent a large part of his life in Charleston. He there became a local preacher in the Methodist church and was not connected directly with the conference.

Mr. Leitch is survived by his wife two daughters, Misses Jennie and Maybelle Leitch, all of Columbia; a son, T. J. Leitch, in the United States navy, and two sons in Charleston, W. W. and B. M. Leitch.

Mr. Leitch and his family lived at the Oliver Gospel Mission, of which he was the active superintendent, on coming to Columbia. He had continued his connection with the mission since assuming the duties of editor of The Way of Faith, a weekly religious paper published in Columbia with an international circulation.

Active charge of the Oliver Gospel Mission was taken over only yesterday by Rev. R. L. Todd, who has had wide experience in missionary work.

Three Killed in Atlanta.

At anta, June 10 .-- Three men were killed and four men and a woman were painfully hurt here tonight by the falling roof of a onestory skating rink. Rains of the past week accumulated a large quantity of water on the roof, the police said, and probably caused it to fall in Among the injured, all of whom were suffering chiefly from bruises and lacerations, was Miss Lillian Perry aged 22, ticket seller at the rink The dead were identified as follows: Hugh Drew, aged 21, grocery clerk, formerly of Tallapoosa, Ga.; J. A. Kimball, of Jackson, Ga.; Jack Conliff, floor manager of the rink.

Say Germans Lost 23 Ships.

London, June 11 .-- According to a dispatch to-day from Ymuiden, Holland, the crew of a trawler which was taken by the Germans to Cuxhaven but was later released, declared they learned at Cuxhaven that of the German vessels participating in the Skagerrak battle six great war vessels and 17 destroyers did not return.

Among the names of the vessels reported lost, adds the dispatch, the sailors say they heard the Ostfriesland, a battleship of 22,440 tons,

FOUR KNOWN DEAD IN FIRE

Which is Thought to Have Origin in a Bomb Plot.

Baltimore, June 13 .- Four men are known to be dead, 45 others are reported killed, 100 were injured, several are missing and \$4,000,000 domage was done as a result of a disastrous fire and explosion which this afternoon destroyed Northern Central Railroad grain elevator No. 3 at 2,000,000 bushels of grain intended for shipment to the allied countries of Europe. The Pennsylvania Rallroad oil pier and two steamships were badly damaged. A bomb plot was hinted by the police.

It was said this afternoon that bodies of dead men were being taken Wilhelm Von Driel, which was crushed by falling walls, but it is impossible to get definite information because the railroad company established rigid lines through which no newspaper men were permitted

All the available fire apparatus of this city was rushed to the scene. British steamship Hall was hurriedly towed to mid-The fire boat Cataract is making desperate efforts to extinguish the flames.

Many of the men working in the place were compelled to jump feet from the top of the building into the harbor. Motor boats and tugs picked up the men as they reached the water.

An unconfirmed report was current later that 25 members of the crew of the Dutch steamship Wilhelm Von Driel were trapped in the hold of the ship and had lost their lives when a wall of the elevator toppled over on

The fire at 5.15 was said to be under control.

Russians Claim Many Prisoners.

Petrograd, June 11 .- Continuing their offensive movement in Volhynia and Galicia, Russin troops yesterday took prisoner 409 officers and 35, 000 men, says the official statement issued here to-day. The Russians also captured 30 guns and an enormous quantity of booty.

Since the present offensive was started a week ago to-day the Russians have taken about 108,000 pris-

Hampshire Sunk by Mine.

London, June 10 .- The British ruiser Hampshire, on which Field Marshal Earl Kitchener and members of his staff were lost, was sunk by a mine, it was officially announced today. All hope of finding victims has been abandoned for all, save the 12 men who were washed ashore on a raft, the statement says.
