State Pen. Out of Business.

(The New Republic, Westerville, Ohio, June 9.)

The management of the Washington State penitentiary at Walla Walla is in the dumps. The penitentiary operates a jute mill and other industries, utilizing convict labor therefor.

In addition to this, the institution has been depended on to supply convict labor for the State highways being built over the State at large expense.

Now there is trouble on hand, and plenty of it. The terms of the hordes of convicts received under the license system have been rapidly expiring and almost no new convicts have been coming in since prohibition went into effect.

The shortage of convict labor is so great that State Highway Commissioner Geo. F. Cotterill states that he can get no convicts to build the State roads and that he must employ free labor for this purpose.

Mayor Michael Toner, of Walla Walla, says that the penitentiary is the only industry in Walla Walla that has been injured by prohibition.

The prison management is finding difficulty in keeping their industries in operation since prohibition went into effect.

GIRL SHOTS BROTHER-IN-LAW.

Mystery Surrounds Attack Which is Likely to Prove Fatal.

Aiken, June 7.—Chester Boyd, fireman and driver of the Aiken fire department automobile truck, was shot and probably fatally wounded about 10:30 o'clock Tuesday night by his sister-in-law, Miss Inez Berrie, a 16-year-old school girl, who was living at his home.

Immediately after the shooting the girl disappeared and the police searched all night and all this morning for her.

The cause of the shooting is shrouded in mystery, but there are many rumors afloat. When questioned by the police Tuesday night as to the cause of the shooting, Boyd declared that the girl shot him about money matters. Her father died in April of this year.

Little hope is entertained by the attending physicians of the recovery of Boyd, who was shot twice through the groin, the intestines being punctured in two places. The girl has made no statement.

A marriage of wide interest throughout Elbert county, the former home of the parents of the bride, occurred on Thursday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Conwell, Lavonia, Ga. The contracting parties were Miss Lula Mae Conwell and Dr. Stewart Brown. The groom is one of the leading physicians and surgeons of this section of the State, and the bride is a young woman of culture and refinement. Their wedding was planned on an elaborate scale, and was to have been one of the biggest church weddings in the history of the little city of Lavonia.

However, on the wedding day the plan was changed, on account of the development of an acute attack of appendicitis from which the bride-to-be suffered Wednesday night. The case developed rapidly, and a speedy operation became imperative. The church wedding plans were hastily changed and the marriage was quietly performed at the home by Rev. M. B. Sams, pastor of the Methodist church, at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Immediately after the ceremony Dr. Boland, of Atlanta, operated on the bride for appendicitis. The operation was successful, and a speedy recovery of Mrs. Brown is confidently predicted. This marriage, tinged with romance, not unmingled with pathos and a suggestion of the tragic, is of more interest in Elbert county because of the fact that the bride's parents are native here. Mrs. Conwell is a daughter of Mrs. A. C. Fortson, of Goss, and has a large family connection in this section, as has Mr. Conwell, also.
