The management of the Washington State penitentiary at Walla Walla is in the dumps. The penitentiary operates a jute mill and other industries, utilizing convict labor therefor,

In addition to this, the institution has been depended on to supply convict labor for the State highways being built over the State at large ex-

Now there is trouble on hand, and plenty of it. The terms of the hordes of convicts received under the license system have been rapidly expiring and almost no new convicts have been coming in since prohibition went into effect.

The shortage of convict labor is so great that State Highway Commissioner Geo. F. Cotterill states that he can get no convicts to build the State roads and that he must employ free labor for this purpose.

Mayor Michael Toner, of Walla Walla, says that the penitentiary is the only industry in Walla Walla that has been injured by prohibition.

The prison management is finding difficulty in keeping their industries in operation since prohibition went

This is one industry that has been 'ruined" by the operations of the State-wide dry plan.


